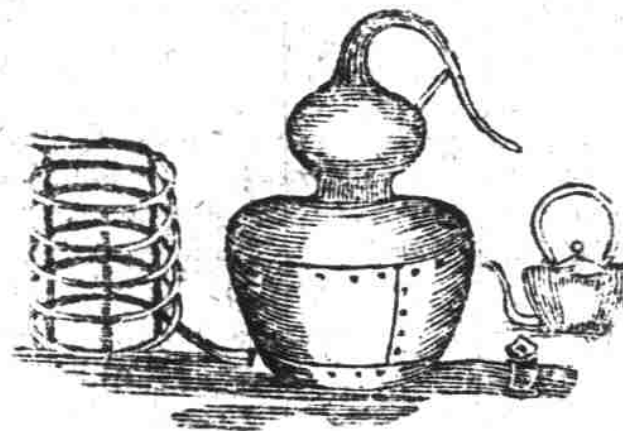
N. B. Perhaps she may have been
