FROM THE SIDELINES

Judging from the way the present heavyweight situation is shaping up for the fall, it looks like Herr Max Schmeling is in for another "bag-holding" contest.

Reports coming to this column has it that Mike Jacobs has the signature of Broadrib, a representative of Tommy Farr, British heavyweight champion, for a championship fight between Louis and Farr some time this fall in New York. If this means anything, then Maxie will have to wait until next spring before he can get his shot at the heavyweight title.

Personally, I don't see how a Louis-Farr bout would draw the kind of gate expected of a heavyweight championship fight, unless half of the British Empire journey across the pond to see the tussle. Of course I may be wrong, but am I?

Farr may be a good fighter and quite capable of "bouncing" the heavyweight division in "Dear ole England", but he isn't a suitable opponent for the hard hitting Louis. Again I may be wrong, but I doubt it. After all, who has he really beaten outside of a fat Max Baer? To do him twelve long rounds to take that. I often wonder what would have happened if Baer had been in the condition he was when the Bomber made him quit in four rounds.

Now don't get me wrong, I have nothing against Farr. In fact I think he's a very clever fighter, but that doesn't make him a drawing card.

In my opinion, a Louis-Schmeling bout in the fall would be a "natural" and would draw in the neighborhood of two million dollars. That's real money in any body's country. Right now every body wants to see Louis and Schmeling met again. Schmeling's backers want to see if he can repeat over Louis; and Louis' backers want to find out if the Bomber will be able to avenge his defeat by Herr Maxie. The boycott that caused Jim Braddock to ignore Schmeling when he, Jim, was ready to defend his title, has disappeared now, and the German again a drawing power.

However, if Schmeling has to wait until next spring to fight, he won't be the same Schmeling. The lay off wouldn't do him any good. Of course the signing of Farr may only be one of Mike Jacobs' publicity stunts to make Schmeling more anxious to fight Louis. It has been done you know.

It seems that contracts mean nothing these days, so Farr's signing isn't too safe a bet that he will really meet Louis. Anyway, that's the impression Braddock gave the public when he ignored his contract with the garden.

With Farr signing to meet Mr. Louis in September for a championship bout, and Schmeling again getting the "run-around," it looks like "screw" business. From where I stand on the sidelines, it looks "Screwier" and screwier everytime I look at it. However, September is a long way off and a thousand things can happen between now and then. Right now, it's too hot to be worrying, so until next week, cheerio.
