Dentists Attend Annual Meet In Washington; To Chicago In 1938

Washington, August 26. (ANP)—With over 300 delegates in attendance from 26 states and the West Indies, the National Dental Association held its 24th annual convention last week. Chicago has been selected for the site of the "silver jubilee" sessions to be held next August.

One of the most important papers read at the conference was by Dr. Joseph H. Nicholson on "Routine Examination of the Mouth." The conference voted to send it to George C. Ruhland, health officer, and Dr. J. A. Murphy, director of school inspection of the U. S. Department of Health.

Samuel Liebowitz, their counsel, is opposed to such publicity and Rev. Harten has expressed fear that should the boys lack proper supervision, they will again get into trouble. He stated also that "an idle head is the devil's work shop."

Monte Hawley of Chicago, fair-skinned actor, will act as the law-

yer in the scene, and it was announced at the theatre that a white man will act the role of the presiding judge.

Olin Montgomery interviewed mumbled that he felt that since he was free he would be his "own man" is seeking a career. The other boys are said to think likewise.

SOUTHERN NEGRO YOUTH CONGRESS ENDORSE BLACK FOR SUPREME COURT

Richmond, Va., (ANP)—Despite Sen. Hugo Black's widely known affiliation with the Ku Klux Klan its support of his election to the senate in 1926 as well as his reputed membership in it, plus his

intention to filibuster against the Wagner-Van Nuys anti-lynching bill had it come up for vote at this session of congress, the Southern Negro Youth congress sent a telegram last week to Washington asking the Alabamian's confirmation as to a justice of the U. S. Supreme Court.

The message signed by William F. Richardson, chairman of the congress, declared his organization represents 260,000 "young colored Americans" who supported President Roosevelt's appointment of Black to the supreme court "in the light of Sen. Black's record in interest of progress and equality."

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
