CHAPEL HILL, October 23.—Carlton Turrentine, 29-year-old citizen of Chapel Hill was fatally shot here Saturday afternoon about 4:30 after engaging in an argument with Eugene Woods, another young man about age 19.

charged upon Woods when the latter pulled a gun from his pocket and fired at Turrentine. The bullet took effect in Turrentine's chest and before medical aid could be summoned he was dead.

Woods has been employed on the new post office now under construction in Chapel Hill and comes from South Carolina. He gave himself up immediately and is being held on a charge of murder. Turrentine had been living in Chapel Hill for several years having moved to this city from Durham. He was a former member of the student body of the North Carolina College for Negroes and played on the varsity football team of that institution.

ALERT JANITOR SAVES SAVES WHITE HOTEL GUEST

Admits Florida Unable To Curb Mob Violence

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—In an amazing statement here October 21, Governor Fred P. Cone, of Florida put his personal approval upon lynching. A delegation of representatives of liberal and church organizations went to the Waldorf Astoria to question Governor Cone about the failure of Florida to prosecute the six Tampa policemen who flogged Joseph Shoemaker to death in December 1935.

"Mr. Governor, you as an executive of the State of Florida approve of people taking the law into their own hands?" he asked. "Any people like that ought to be hung to the nearest lamp post," the Governor repeated. "Would you take part in such things?" Mr. Clendennin asked. "Anybody came down to my house and I didn't want 'em, I wouldn't go to the law," said the Governor. "I'd take the law into my own hands."

Haile Selassie, AS EMPEROR OF ETHIOPIA, SUES FOR \$50,000. LONDON, Eng., October 23.—(ANP)—The disputed right of Haile Selassie to retain the title of Emperor of Ethiopia was brought up last Monday in Chancery Court when the former ruler sued Cable and Wireless for \$50,000, claimed to be due him under an agreement for public Ethiopia-British wireless services when he fled from Addis Ababa. The company contends that King Victor Emanuel of Italy, thru conquest is now sovereign of Ethiopia, Selassie's cause of action thus vesting in the Italian Government. Selassie's counsel maintains that the British Government still recognizes him as Emperor. The counsellor stated that a recent statement by Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden supported his contention that Selassie is still de jure Emperor as Eritria "had not recognized Italian annexation of Ethiopia as de jure (by right)."

Geo. Greenshaw Answers Wife's Charge Of Non-Support With Suit

A shock was received by teachers and professional men and women of Raleigh and Clarkton, N. C. when George E. Greenshaw, Method, N. C. was ordered by the Judge of City Court, Raleigh, to contribute \$20.00 per month to the support of his wife, Mrs. Meta Raglan Greenshaw, after being found guilty of the charge. It was brought out that Mr. Greenshaw, after being served with warrant for non-support and abandonment, in an effort to avoid supporting his wife filed suit for divorce on the grounds of two years separation, which statement the court found to be untrue as he acknowledged that he had lived with her until June 1937. Greenshaw used his

daughter as witness against his wife in an unsuccessful effort to show that she had been unfaithful to him. Mrs. Greenshaw, who is a popular singer and business woman of Raleigh, N. C. states that her husband abandoned her here in the city of Philadelphia with his daughter by a former marriage after sending them there with the promise of support until he should send for them to return to their home, Method, N. C. This he failed to do according to testimony and she was compelled to work to support herself and step-daughter and become seriously ill from the effect of strain and worry.
