**5,993 ITALIAN SOLDIERS KILLED IN PAST TWO MONTHS**

**LONDON, Jan. 26.** — During the past two months, 5993 Italian and native soldiers and 16 Italian officers have been killed in battles with Ethiopian guerrilla units in north and northwest Ethiopia, the Ethiopian Legation announced in a statement today.

The Legation, which represents the government of Emperor Haile Selassie, declared that Ethiopian resistance to Italian forces was continuing.

It added that three battalions of Eritrean troops deserted their Italian command and that machine guns, rifles, field artillery and ammunition and 43 trucks were captured by Ethiopian natives.

The Legation related the massacre of 18 Italian officers by natives in Debra Markos, Gojam Province, because of "non-observance of certain conditions" by the Italians.

The statement said 30 to 40 Italian planes from Addis Ababa were conducting daily reprisals in Gojam.

**WILLIE JEFFERIES SAYS HE IS NOT GUILTY OF SHORT WEIGHT CHARGE**

Willie Jefferies age 16, told a representative of the Carolina Times here this week that he was innocent of the charge brought against him by a customer of the Daylight Grocery Company that he sold him short weight when he went to the store to purchase twenty four cents worth of pork. Mitchell Bergman, proprietor of the store stated, in the presence of the representative of the Carolina Times, that he was willing to vouch for the honesty and integrity of young Jefferies. Mr. Bergman also stated that he has observed the young man since he has been in his employment and is positive that he is honest and would not deliberately short weigh any one.

Mr. Bergman who was in Florida at the time the offense was said to have been committed stated that he does not understand why his name was included in the warrant unless it was because he is proprietor of the store. He also stated that it would mean nothing to Jefferies to short weigh a customer since he was not the cashier and did not go in the cash register, but turned over all moneys collected, in waiting on customers, to the person hired for that purpose.

Investigation discloses that young Jefferies bears a good reputation from other employers under whom he has worked, when asked whether his employer had ever told him to short weigh customers or cheat them in anyway, Young Jefferies replied in the negative.

Mr. Bergman stated that as a proof of his confidence in the character of Jefferies he intended to go the limit to defend his name.

The Daylight store has operated under the proprietorship of Mr. Bergman on Dowd street for nearly two years and has enjoyed a large patronage of persons living in and near the community employs four or five Negro clerks.

and the rest of the time in Chicago and Detroit. We were together until he left recently for New York to begin training for his coming bout with Nathan Mann.

As for charges that he had fallen hard for a night club girl, Mrs. Louis scoffed at the idea. The Brown Bomber often visits cabarets when not in training, she said, and many of the entertainers consider it a privilege to sit at the table of a celebrity and converse with him. But Joe, she says, has not entered his attentions upon any one of them.
