# Talladega Library To Be Named For Negro Slave

TALLADEGA, Ala., Feb. 23.—The new library building now being erected is to be named in honor of William Savery, an original founder and incorporator of Talladega College. There will be two plaques in the entrance vestibule commemorating the founders of the college here in Talladega, while the name of Mr. Savery will be inscribed over the entrance door on the west side of the building.

In 1852-53 William Savery, a carpenter in bondage, labored to build Old Swaine Hall. In 1865, as a freedman, he together with others attended the conference in Mobile. This convention was made up of freedmen from all parts of Alabama; and its purpose was to lay plans for racial progress. Along with Thomas Tarrant, anex-slave, William Savery returned to Talladega and immediately started a school in the residence of David White, Ga., another freedman. By rapidly outgrowing its first quarters, the school presented a problem of larger housing for its work. In 1867 Savery led the Freedman's Bureau and the American Missionary Association in the purchase of Old Swaine Hall and the founding of Talladega College. This building still serves the college as a traditional landmark and as an administration hall. In 1869, an incorporator of the col-

lege, Savery wrote into its charter a provision "to provide educational opportunities for all youth, from which no one shall be debarred because of race or color."

Thomas Tarrant, Harry Knox, and other freedmen, who worked with William Savery in the founding of Talladega, will be commemorated on one of the plaques in the entrance vestibule.

The new Savery Library, which is one of the sixteen buildings on Talladega's campus, is the first named for the first pioneer, in the great work that Talladega is carrying on. As the building is a memorial to the pioneering spirit of Savery and others, it will continue this tradition by serving the Talladega community in addition to the college, thereby pioneering into the area of College-Community Cooperation. It is anticipated that the new library, which is about one third completed at the present time, will be ready for use the fall of '38.

# RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CHURCH

EDUCATION is a repetitive process. Each generation must undergo the process of and for itself. The problem of education, as such, is certainly one with which the church should concern itself. The fact is that at one time all secular and religious education was largely in the hands of or under the influence of the church. And, so today, for many and sundry reasons real education looks to the church for its inspiration and guidance. It has been the burden of the best minds of each age through time immemorial.

Gifted souls here and there touched with that spark of divinity that is in all men and all beings, move about the face of the earth like the reflex of an arc light, doing good here and there, leaving a slight impress and in some imperceptible way contributing to the ultimate aim and purpose of life and living. Men of the church, worthy offsprings of all the saints under the crucifixion of the cross, inspired with a flame of purification and uplift, what are you going to do about it? Have you not heard the challenge? Does not the zoom of its resounding drive through the air strike fire in your souls and light you up with a new inspiration?

Christ came to bring peace on earth and good-will to men. He grew into manhood, impressed his followers with the nature and origin of his divinity, confounded the elders in the temple; but the problems that arose and the discussions from his teachings finally led to a repudiation by the elders and the wise men that ended in a Gethsemane. He arose from the dead, ascended unto the Father, but gave a great message of salvation and redemption to suffering mankind. The Christian church, re-inspired by this revelation, took hold anew and started, as it seemed, upon the pathway to a new life and new living. It was not long, however, before selfishness, greed, and lust for power, aided by the native genius of the human mind with its portions of cunning, luck, and ability combined, began to inject into the world of life and thought unsonorous elements that were sooner or later to produce a still greater confusion.

To me there is something that is awful and tragic as well as sublime and inspiring in the struggles of man, since the birth of Christ; to find his way in this world and to overcome the oppressing loads which have fallen upon his shoulders, through the weaknesses of the flesh.

The great church fathers, Wm. of Occam, Augustinus, Thomas of Aquin, and their compeers labored diligently to righten the whole ship of religion and set her going amidst the storms that burst upon the seas. Just about the time that it seemed that they would win, science came in to create new storms that beset with all their fury a tranquillizing ocean. Roger and Francis Bacon, Rene Descartes, Baruch de Spinoza, Gottlieb Leibnitz, David Hume, John Locke, Emmanuel Kant, John Hobbes, all joined in the great fray upon the extended battle front, and when the battle was over and the din and smoke of the forum had cleared away and man found his whereabouts, he discovered that in spite of all, in the midst of great confusion, there reigned supreme some things that escaped the holocaust and by survival seemed to partake of divinity and immortality.

Modern industrialism, with its problems of capital and labor, politics and government, approaches the problem from a new angle but only seems to throw new confusion into the great ponderous machinery of modern civilization. And so today in the name of the Christian church, the church of Luther Calvin, Zwingli, of the Wesleys, of our own Allen and Payne, and of all those saints who labored in this great vineyard and have now gone to peace and reward, we come again to face the same fundamental issues and to solve again the same fundamental problems of life and living and the rulings of an all-knowing and all-pervasive God. We raise the same question, answer the same challenge, receive the same gauntlet. What are we going to do about it? What have we to say? There is something permanent and abiding in the world. There is a God who rules the universe. The story of redemption is true. To us the way is clear. The duty of the church is to teach the people, to show them the way of the living God.

Education must be, but in order to be worthwhile education must be administered to a suppliant heart, a soul that has been bathed in the baptism of fire. The youth of our land must first learn that God lives and rules the world as the only real and true supreme being, and He has His hand in the affairs of men, and that faith in Him is the only safe-guarding power for the successful efforts of men and women who would serve their day and generation.

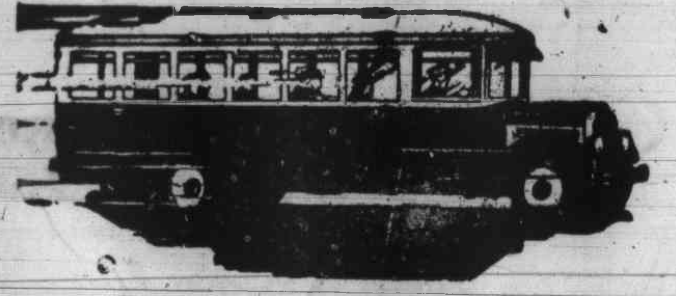
OE—Tell me if it would be advisable for me to buy the lot I have in mind right now or wait a while?

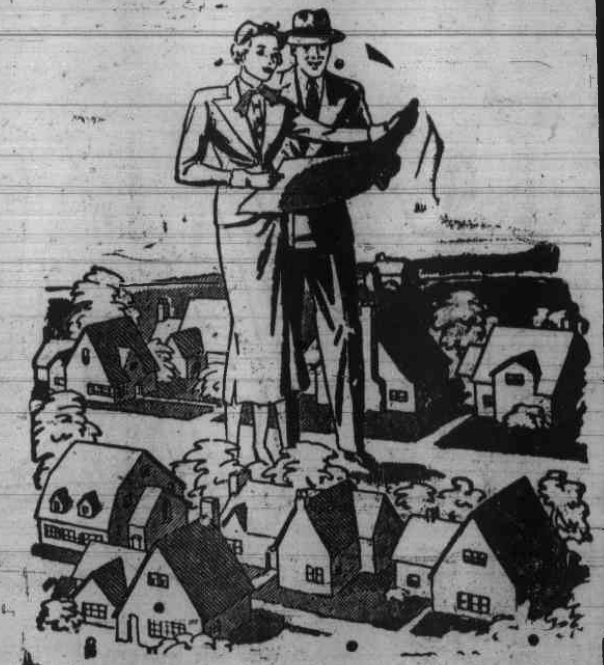
