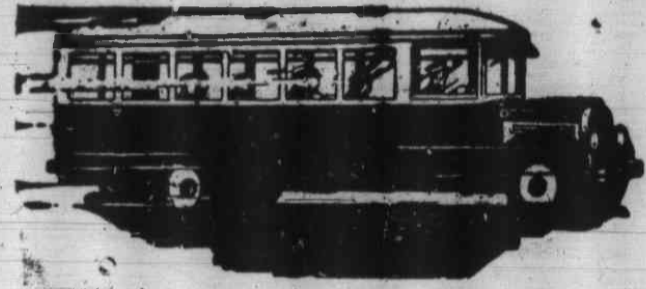

Huge Drug Chain Fights Jobs For Negroes

NEW YORK, June.—(Carl Carter for CNA)— Race discrimination received another major setback in New York yesterday when the Liggett's store—America's largest chain of drug stores—was forced by the coordinating Committee for Employment to give jobs to Negroes.

According to A. Johnson, executive secretary of the Committee J. Clark, representing the powerful drug chain, agreed to hire two Negroes within the next two weeks, and three more within another fortnight.

The Negroes who will be hired in the capacity of salesmen and junior pharmacists, will work in the Harlem stores. The Committee for Employment picketed the Liggett's stores in Harlem for three days before the agreement was reached.

The new president requested all members to bring five cents to each monthly meeting. Business closed.

After playing several games the class was served ice cream and cake.

At 11:00 A. M. the executive committee met and discussed the year's work, which included an intensive campaign for membership, and locating all graduates of the college also a constant drive for a good working program for the alumni.

At 1:00 P. M. the group attended the Alumni Luncheon, at which time President F. D. He stated that the freshman Agricultural class was the largest in the county among Negro Institutions giving statistics substantiating this fact. He stated that 60 per cent of the entire student body was registered in the mechanical and agricultural departments.

42,935 Cases Of Measles Reported Through May

RALEIGH—If measles, which has been prevalent in epidemic form this year, with 42,935 cases reported through May, follows the precedent set in 1928, there will be something like 75,000 cases in 1939.

But next year's incidence cannot be forecast, it was pointed out by Dr. J. C. Knox, director of the Division of Epidemiology of the State Board of Health. In words, measles, according to Dr. Knox, is not predictable. The number of cases reported in 1927 was 32,000. The next year the total jumped to 60,543, making 1928 the peak year for all time.

The peak year during the past five-year period, as shown on the chart, was reached in 1934, when 55,764 cases were reported in North Carolina. Then, there was a drop. The next year, the number of cases decreased to 10,688, then to 1,395 in 1936 and 7,937 last year. The disease

manifested itself in epidemic form early this year, and schools in many sections were closed because of its prevalence.

The greatest incidence occurs in children between 6 and 7 years old, Dr. Knox said, and most fatalities occur among children under 5 years old.

The rise and fall of chickenpox and whooping cough are not, by any means, coincident with the rise and fall of measles. The all time peak for whooping cough was in 1927, when 19,966 cases were reported, while the chickenpox peak was in 1930, with 6,982 cases reported, the chart shows.

With the closing of the schools this year, in May, the incidence of measles took a sharp drop and the epidemic abated.

FLORIDA DEPUTIES RENEW TERROR

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla., June.—(CNA)— A renewal of the recent reign of terror against Negroes was observed here this week when deputies of the county sheriff's office arrested Bob Davis, and held him without charges.

Davis was arrested as he alighted from a bus, coming from the state convention of the Communist Party, held at Jacksonville. He was later released after Attorney W. Dow Woodward of the International Labor Defense protested the arrest as "Shameless terror."

As he was lead out of the county jail he was threatened by the deputies and warned to leave town. Officials of the sheriff's office remarked that they "cannot guarantee Davis' safety if he stays in Fort Lauderdale. The people are awful hot about this."

Taking issue with the sheriff's statement, the International Labor Defense declared: "It is plain that the 'people' referred to were the law enforcement officials themselves who represent the white planters that instigated the raid on the Communist Party unit meeting April 28,
