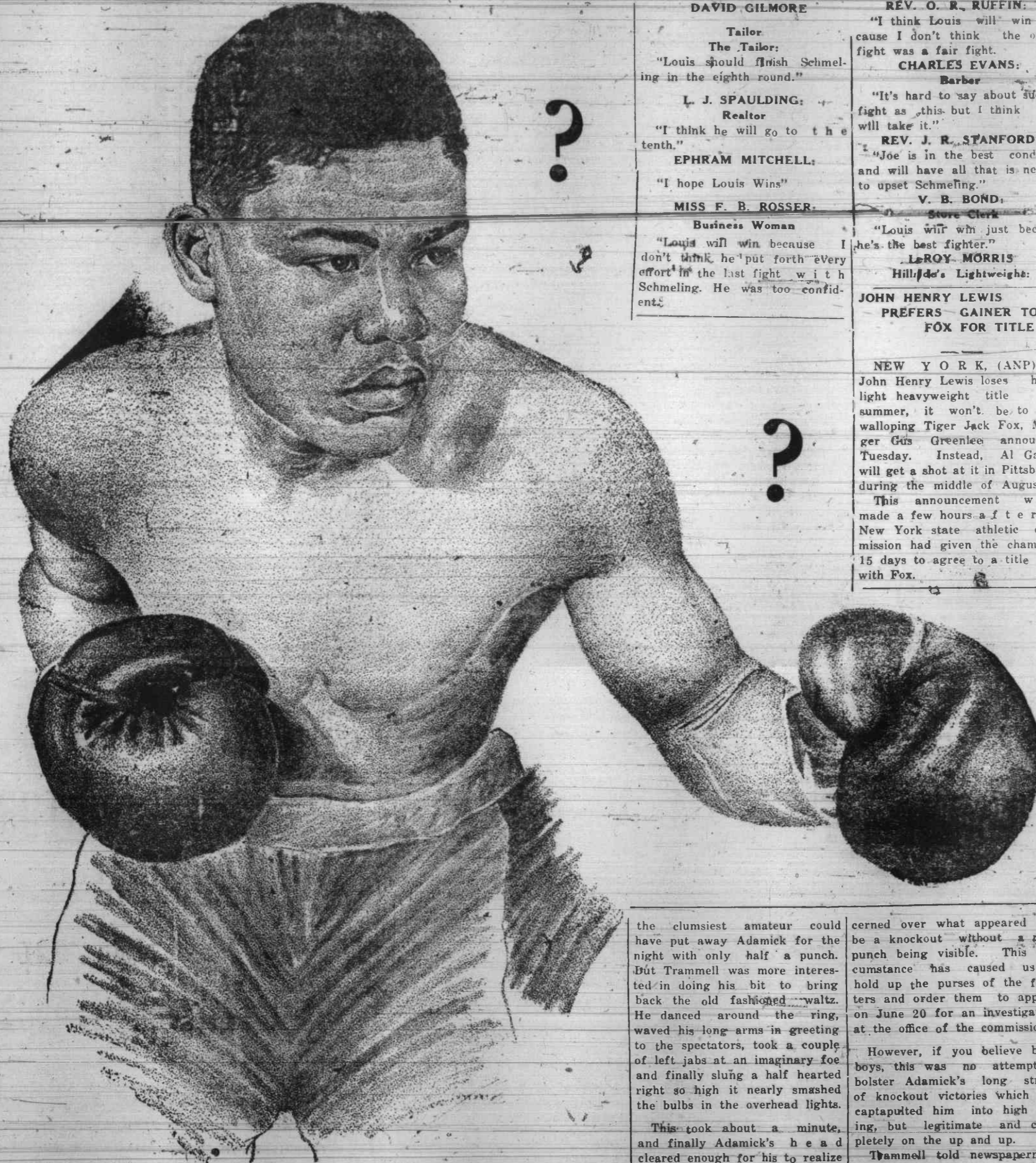
Coach Army Armstrong has been a great aid to the boys in their daily workouts and he is expected to see no small amount of action during the season's tilt.

## Adamick, Trammell To Explain Queer Kayo To Illinois Commission

CHICAGO, (ANP)—Next Monday, June 20, the state boxing commission will gather to hear Jimmy Adamick, white Detroit heavyweight, and Jack Trammell the Youngstown, O., brown beanpole, explain just how it was that the latter was kayoed by a mystery wallop that grazed his shoulder in a fight scheduled for 10 rounds at Mills stadium last Wednesday night.

And it had better be good, too, or both boys will face the loss of their uncollected purses as well as suspension for putting on what has been described as one of the greatest fakes ever witnessed in this racketeer's paradise.

Adamick, protégé of Jack Dempsey and potential world champion. In his recent start he knocked out Al Ettore in four rounds and defeated Harry Thomas. Trammell, the 6 foot 4 inch Ohioan, was rated well up among the world's first 10 heavyweights a couple of years ago and in recent starts has twice defeated Obie Walker. When the match was made, it looked like a natural.

The first round started in regulation fashion with both boys feeling each other out and Trammell holding his toe at first with a long left. But in the first minute of the second, Jack apparently forgot himself and brought over that right which

**NEW YORK, (ANP)—**If John Henry Lewis loses his light heavyweight title this summer, it won't be to the walloping Tiger Jack Fox, Manager Gus Greenlee announced Tuesday. Instead, Al Gainer will get a shot at it in Pittsburgh during the middle of August.

This announcement was made a few hours after the New York state athletic commission had given the champion 15 days to agree to a title bout with Fox.

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the clumsiest amateur could have put away Adamick for the night with only half a punch. But Trammell was more interested in doing his bit to bring back the old fashioned waltz. He danced around the ring, waved his long arms in greeting to the spectators, took a couple of left jabs at an imaginary foe and finally slung a half hearted right so high it nearly smashed the bulbs in the overhead lights.

This took about a minute, and finally Adamick's head cleared enough for him to realize where he was. Trammell came closer then. The white boy weakly tossed a left hook that grazed the point of Trammell's shoulder. Jack turned around slowly, picked out a soft spot, and then collapsed gently and neatly on the floor, pillowing his head on his arm.

The referee didn't want to count. He roared at Trammell to get up, then continued count to 10. That was the knockout.

It seemed to observers that Trammell, finding Adamick such a decided soft touch, decided it was best to end the fight according to the script just as soon as he could instead of taking chances on beating the White Hope. Unfortunately, the Youngstown mauler is no good at histrionics.

The crowd of 3,146 stood in their seats to boo and jeer. Immediately Chairman Joe Triner and J. R. Fitzpatrick of the athletic commissions announced the purses of both boxers would be held up pending an investigation.

After talking to both boxers in their dressing rooms, Triner said, "the commission is con-

cerned over what appeared to be a knockout without a n y punch being visible. This circumstance has caused us to hold up the purses of the fighters and order them to appear on June 20 for an investigation at the office of the commission.

However, if you believe both boys, this was no attempt to bolster Adamick's long string of knockout victories which has captivated him into high rating, but legitimate and completely on the up and up.

Trammell told newspapermen that the fatal punch was a left hook that landed above his eye, and in evidence offered a small scar above his left orb. He did not, however, explain how a left hook could land above an opponent's eye with enough force to score a kayo.

But if you listen to Adamick, hit Jack on the jaw (not above the eye) with a punch "so hard I felt it all the way up to my elbow, Jimmy Brady, one of the "waller's" handlers, said that Trammell "quit like a dog."

Adamick weighed 193 pounds to 185 for Trammell. The latter had been kayoed only twice before last Wednesday night's fight.

In the preliminaries, L. e. m Franklin, last year's International Golden Gloves heavyweight champion, continued his string of quick pro knockouts by putting Sandy McDonald, white, to sleep in the first round of a six round bout.

The gate bids fair to be one of the best Mike Jacobs the promoter has ever had to a heavy weight boxing bout. Fans from all parts of the country are announcing their intentions to be present to witness one of the best fights of the century.
