BEALE (MOTHER) AVENUE BAPTIST CHURCH STRUCK BY LIGHTNING

MEMPHIS, July 2, (By Jas. C. Dickerson for ANP) The First Baptist church, Beale Ave. (better known as Beale Street Baptist church), was struck by a bolt of lightning Sunday at 6 p. m. just about the time a half dozen worshippers gathered for the BYPU session. The meeting suddenly ended by the church's being locked and temporarily condemned by firemen and city authorities.

The statue of John the Baptist, adorning a steeple of the church, diverted the bolt, preventing more serious damage than the two holes smashed in the roof and a sidewalk cracked from the steeple. None were killed or injured, save a score of pigeons, nesting in the steeple.

The church is one of the largest and oldest of city's colored churches, and is the mother church of some eight or ten others that split from it as the years passed. The congregation is under the pastorate of Dr. G. A. Long, who is widely known over the United States, being affiliated with the National Baptist Convention of which the Rev. H. A. Boyd is sec'y.
