## Joe Louis Scores Quickest Knock Out In Heavyweight History In Win Over Max

YANKEE STADIUM (RING-SIDE) JUNE 22, Motivated by a burning desire to wipe out the defeat he suffered at the hands of Max Schmeling two years ago in this amphitheatre, Joe Louis, world's heavyweight boxing champion, all but annihilated Germany's great champion in the quickest and most sensational heavyweight fight on record.

While a pall fell upon the vast assembly that packed every inch of Jake Ruppert's ball park calmly and with great deliberation. The bronzed wonder man dug his shoes into the ring floor, awaiting the clang of the bell. Even before its ominous peal had sounded, the "NEW LOUIS" bounded over towards his crafty opponent and stabbed him with two hard left hand leads that scored with the speed of rifle shot.

A terrific short right to the ribs that from our press seat appeared to TEAR SCHMELING'S RIBS RIGHT OUT OF THEIR CASSEMENTS. . . was a delivered by Joe. For a second Joe forgot to get his guard up and the German, as he did two years ago, smashed through a hard right to the chin. Louis

took it without blinking an eye, and our heart beat like jungle tom-toms. Suddenly, and with all the fabled power of the "Hammer of Thor" Louis went into action. A left, another hook, a right, and Schmeling dropped to the canvas. Up at referee Arthur Donovan's four count, the German tried desperately to tie the Embury up, but it was no dice. A furious succession of the hardest blows mortal eyes have lamed, put Schmeling on deck again for the last time, the most badly beaten fighter anyone has ever seen in so short a time.

The crowd went wild, LOUIS WAS LITERALLY MOBBED BY ADMIRERS, a new page was written in MILLION DOLLAR FIGHTS and our great director CEAUDE A. BARNETT. . . was a somewhere-out-there-in-that-set-of-faces, as your other local correspondent (Alvin E. White) and your wildly excited humble servant.

We never expect to live long enough to witness a finer spectacle than the splendid American Negro youth, keeping the title safe here in this country where we think it belongs.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. June 29.—Tuskegee Institute scored 14 points in the National Intercollegiate Track and Field Championship held at Memorial Stadium to the Columbus University of Indiana, Penn. State College, Kansas State College, Pittsburgh University, University of Texas, University of California, Miami University, University of Montana, Georgia Tech, Marquette University, Harvard University, University of Oklahoma, N. Y. University, University of N. C., Rhode Island State, Perdue and Washington State.

Southern California won the meet with 69 3/4 points; Stanford University was second with 38; University of Michigan third with 28 1/2; Wisconsin fourth with 28, Notre Dame University and Rice Institut etied for fifth with 24 each. Ohio State University and Michigan State University tied for sixth with 20. The University of Colorado was seventh with 17, Oregon University was eighth with 16. University of California at Los Angeles was ninth with 15, and Columbus U. and Tuskegee Institute tied for tenth with 14 each.

Other scores were: Indiana U. 11; Penn. State College 10; Kansas State College 10; Pittsburgh University 10, Texas U. 9, University of California 9, Miami University 8, University of Montana 6, Prairie View College 6, Georgia Tech 6, Xavier University 4 1/4; Marquette University 3 1/4; Harvard University 2; Oklahoma A. and M. 2; New York University 2; San Jose State 2; Rhode Island State 1; Perdue 1 and Washington State 1.

### MINNIAPOLIS, Minn. June 29

### COUNTY SCHOOLS TO LOSE TWO TEACHERS

According to a recent report from Luther H. Harbour, superintendent of the Durham County Schools, the Negro schools of the county must sacrifice two of their already insufficient number of teachers to the white system.

Stagville and Markham's Chapel are the two schools which have been assigned one less teacher each for the new year while the white schools, Oak Grove and Rosemount, will gain one teacher each.

The reason given for this apportionment is the continued growth of the enrollment in the white schools and the decreased enrollment in the colored schools. The superintendent asserts that the decline in the enrollment of the colored schools grows out of the fact that a large part of the rural Negro population is moving toward the city.
