Beauty Culturists Hold 8th Annual Convention

CHICAGO, Sept. 22. (ANP).—The 18th National Convention of the National Beauty Culturists' League of America which closed here last Friday at the Savoy ballroom went on record as adopting the following resolutions as definite laws of the League.

First, that all "Race Beauty Shops, Culture Schools and all Beauty Establishments" of any description "Buy and Use Products and Commodities manufactured by Negro concerns."

Second, that every beautician the country over, regardless of the section, charge at least seventy five cents, preferably \$1.00 for a shampoo and press, according to the length and thickness of the hair. The same prices of 75c and \$1.00 and up was suggested for the Marcel, finger wave, and croquignole wave. The reasons given for these suggested prices were due to the fact that various delegates attending the National Convention reported that a number of persons were working for thirty five and fifty cents.

Third, that the Beauticians of the United States become interested in all legislation affecting their business and also the legislation affecting the workers of the great middle class, especially domestic, office and factory workers and those persons in the

lower wage brackets. The national president, Marjorie Stewart Joyner, appointed a legislative group and has under way a plan for legislative activities that will bring about a greater social security for these various groups.

Fourth, shorter working hours for the Beautician was urged in order that beauticians have more leisure time. All beauticians are requested to arrange their hours on an eight hour a day schedule, as this a great necessity in regard to the health.

Fifth, Wassermann Tests was suggested for all beauticians in order that they could assure themselves and their customers that their operators were clean and healthy, thereby safeguarding the public health.

Dr. Herman N. Bundesen of the Chicago Board of Health made the Wassermann test possible for the delegates by sending physicians and nurses to the convention and they made free blood tests of every beautician.

Sixth, all Beauticians were urged to attend school at least one month out of every year, in order to raise their standard.

The National Beauty Culturists League set up a new department known as the "Bureau of Standards."
