I. L. D. LEADER RAPS DIES WITNESS

NEW YORK, Dec. 8. (CNA)—Congressman elect Vito Marcantonio this week denounced a Dies Committee witness as an "unmitigated liar," and demanded the right to appear before the committee to answer charges concerning him.

Marcantonio's telegram to the Texas Congressman followed the appearance before the Dies body of Sam Baron who stated that the International Labor Defense which the Congressman elect heads is a "Communist front" organization.

The I. L. D. which numbers thousands of Negroes among its membership, and has a brilliant record of struggle for Negro rights, especially in such celebrated cases as Scottsboro and Herndon, was described Marcantonio as a body that "is opposed to any form of discrimination against anyone, because of race, creed or color."

Among those denying the accusation and demanding the right to send representatives to testify before the committee were the American Student Union, the League for Industrial Democracy, the Committee for Aid of China and the Medical Bureau and North American Committee for Aid of Spanish Democracy.

Meanwhile the committee continues its witch hunting drive against all those individuals and organizations that stand for social progress. It has announced its intention to seek legislation making itself permanent, and a fund of \$200,000 to carry on its "work."

Its attacks on the New Deal Deal was resumed again this week when Dies asked for the resignation from the President's cabinet of Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes, New Deal friend of the Negro people, and Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins. Dies also demanded the resignation of WPA Administrator Harry Hopkins.

A sharp statement was sent to Dies this week by Professor John Dewey, Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr, Harry W. Laidler and Norman Thomas, members of the League for Industrial Democracy.

The statement described Mr. Dies as "abysmally ignorant" and a protagonist of fascist ideas. It urged him to cease his misrepresentations, and "devote what time and mentality he may have to a constructive solution of the tragic social evils which are today threatening our democratic institutions."

(Continued from page 4) color, the "one in a million" chance that is given, as in the case of Miss Anderson, is absolutely not enough.

We are proud of Miss Anderson, and we are proud of Collier's gesture, but we insist that it is the lack of recognition of genuine talent in the Negro group that may yet make American sorry.

NEW CONFERENCE We hear that another conference of Negro leaders will be held in Washington early next year, for the purpose of giving President Roosevelt another report on conditions in the race. While we do not exactly approve of the WAY this conference is scheduled to be held, financed by the taxpayers, some good may still come of it. In the final analysis, it is the President, paying for a report, and the report, in all, probability, will reflect nothing that the President might not wish to hear.

We approve the methods of diplomacy used by the inter-racial lists, but we do not approve these methods in politics that we do not think these methods should become paramount in Negro life. We believe that in politics, plain speaking should be the order of the day, for the ballot is the last refuge of the Negro, and if he soft pedals that, it is his doom. People on the payroll of the administration cannot stand up and talk, except in rendering official reports.

Where the Negro needs a voice is in the Democratic National Committee. One voice there, either official or unofficial, so long as it is recognized, will give the race more dignity and respect than anything else done by the Administration to date.

ALAMANCE MAN CHARGED WITH DAUGHTER'S MURDER

GRAHAM, N. C., December 8. (Special)—A charge of murder has been lodged against Walter Bradshaw of the Faucette township, whose 16 year old daughter was found dead at their home on Tuesday, November 29 with her skull fractured and burns about her face and upper body. It is believed that the burns were caused by her clothing becoming ignited from the fireplace near which the body was found.

Bradshaw has stated that he is unable to explain the death because he had gone milking early in the morning and did not learn of the child's death until he was informed by his Dud, who found the body.

WPA Writers, Artists Face Loss Of Jobs

NEW YORK, Dec. 7. (CNA)—Many Negro writers and artists on WPA face the loss of their jobs between now and February 1939, if there is no renewal of the Federal WPA appropriation for the Five Arts Projects, the Crusader News Agency learned this week. A campaign for renewal of the appropriation is being conducted by the Workers Alliance, and its affiliated groups.

It is estimated more than one-third of the Federal Writers Project personnel would be affected if the appropriation is not renewed. This would seriously hamper, if not make impossible, continuance of the Negro

Writers group which is at work on "The Negroes of New York" planned as a history of the Negroes role in building up the metropolis.

The book deals with the problems and struggles of the group in New York City from the Dutch period up to the present. The staff is comprised entirely of former editors, feature and magazine writers, reporters and novelists.

Their overwhelming sentiment is that for the first time, the true story of the Negro's contribution to all phases of the big city's industrial, educational, cultural and religious life will be told.

They also feel that if the findings go through, the Writers Project, an important outlet for Negro cultural talent, for whom opportunities are all too few, will be virtually closed.
