All the Girl Reserves in the city will meet at the Y July 3 and each one is asked to bring a friend. The Girl Reserves will meet only once a month during the summer.

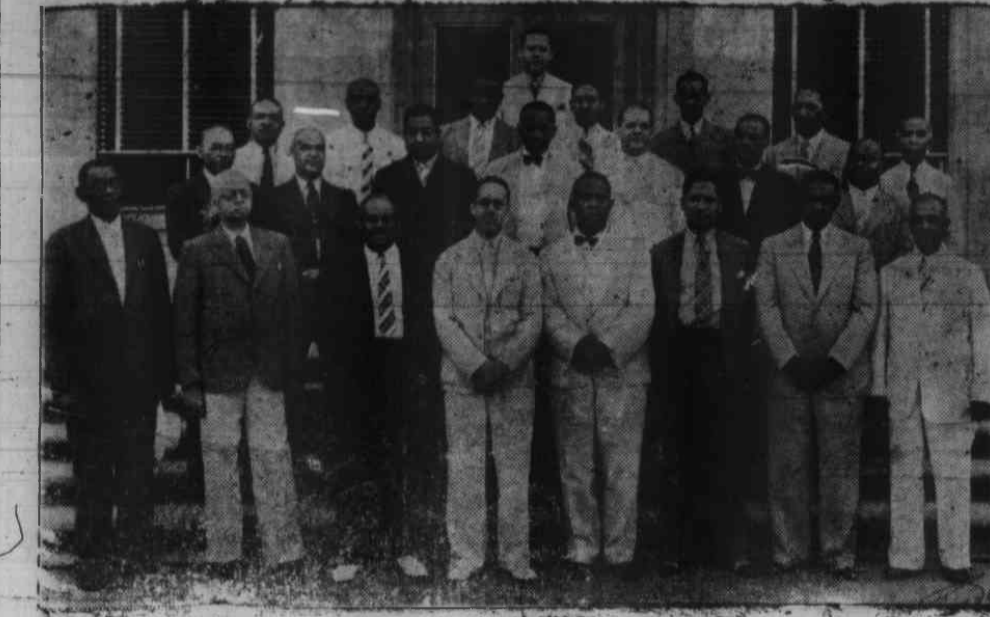

Little Miss Schuyler Appears Here

A remarkably large audience consisting mainly of younger people thrilled at the amazing and almost unbelievable executions of little Miss Philippa Schuyler seven year old pianist composer who made her only Durham appearance in B. N. Duke Auditorium at North Carolina College at 7:30 p. m. Friday June 23.

Miss Schuyler's program consisted of regular concert material taken from the works of Bach, Clementi, Lisadow, Beethoven, Schumann, Heller; Chopin; MacDowell; Ibert, Mozart, and Rimsky Korsakvo. The second part of the program was made up of the little artist's original compositions.

The first group of three numbers were the works of Bach: Prelude No. 3, C. Minor, Fugue No. 5, C Major and the Two Part Invention Vol. 379 No. 4, D Major and F Major. In the second group Philippa played three movements of Clementi's Sonatina, Opus 36 no. 1; and the Music Box by Lisadow. Beethoven's 'Metronome' from the eighth symphony was the opening number in the third group and was followed by Schumann's 'Soldier's March'. The Curious Story by Heller concluded the group.

Group 4 consisted of The Minute Waltz by Chopin, 'MacDowell's "To A Wild Rose," and "The Little White Donkey" by Ibert. The first number in Group 5 of part I was Mozart's Waltz in G Major and the applause was loud and long for the final number in the group, the ever popular "Flight of the Bumble-Bee" by Rimsky Korsakov.

The part of Miss Schuyler's program which followed the information consisted entirely of her own compositions. From her compositions at 4 she played "The Wolf" and "The Goldfish." From Compositions at five the audience thrilled at "Autumn Rain" and "Spring" Compositions at the age of six supplied "The Cockroach Ballet" "The Night gale's Death" and the "Jolly Pig" as well as The Arabian Suite

Her instructor from the beginning has been Miss Arnetta Jones, graduate of the Juilliard School of Music. Miss Jones states that Philippa made up her own scales and created her first compositions with them as a basic. No Note, period; motive of phrase has ever been changed by anyone.
