Palmer Kayos Dawson

In a slugging that kept Clarence "Fog" Palmer on the defense for the greater part of the four rounds Zola Dawson went down and out when these heavyweights met in a "Grudge" fight at the Hillside Park High School Friday night, June 28. The end came after about 1 minute and a half of the fourth round when both fighters were beginning to look as though they would fall out any minute from fatigue. According to the judges all of the first three rounds went to Dawson but Palmer happened to find the right spot to send him down for the count of ten.

It was a straight right to the jaw that did the job.

The fight started with Palmer tearing into Dawson at top speed and with Dawson fighting very cautiously. Both fighters seemed to be getting over their "Sunday" punches at times but they both showed iron resistance in shaking off

punches and always coming in for more. As the fight went on it appeared that Palmer was tiring faster than his opponent but a dressing room interview after the fight revealed that Dawson took the count because he was 'out of wind.'

The preliminary fights attracted just about as much attention as the main bout. In the opener it took about a round and a half for Elijah Hayes to score a knockout over Leonard Phillips of the C. C. C. In the first frame Phillips was knocked out of the ring but still came in for more.

But in the second round he was unable to continue under Hayes' shower of knockout blows which continuously found their mark.

The bout between Steel and Powell was a more even match although Steel was awarded a TKO when his opponent was unable to continue in the final round.
