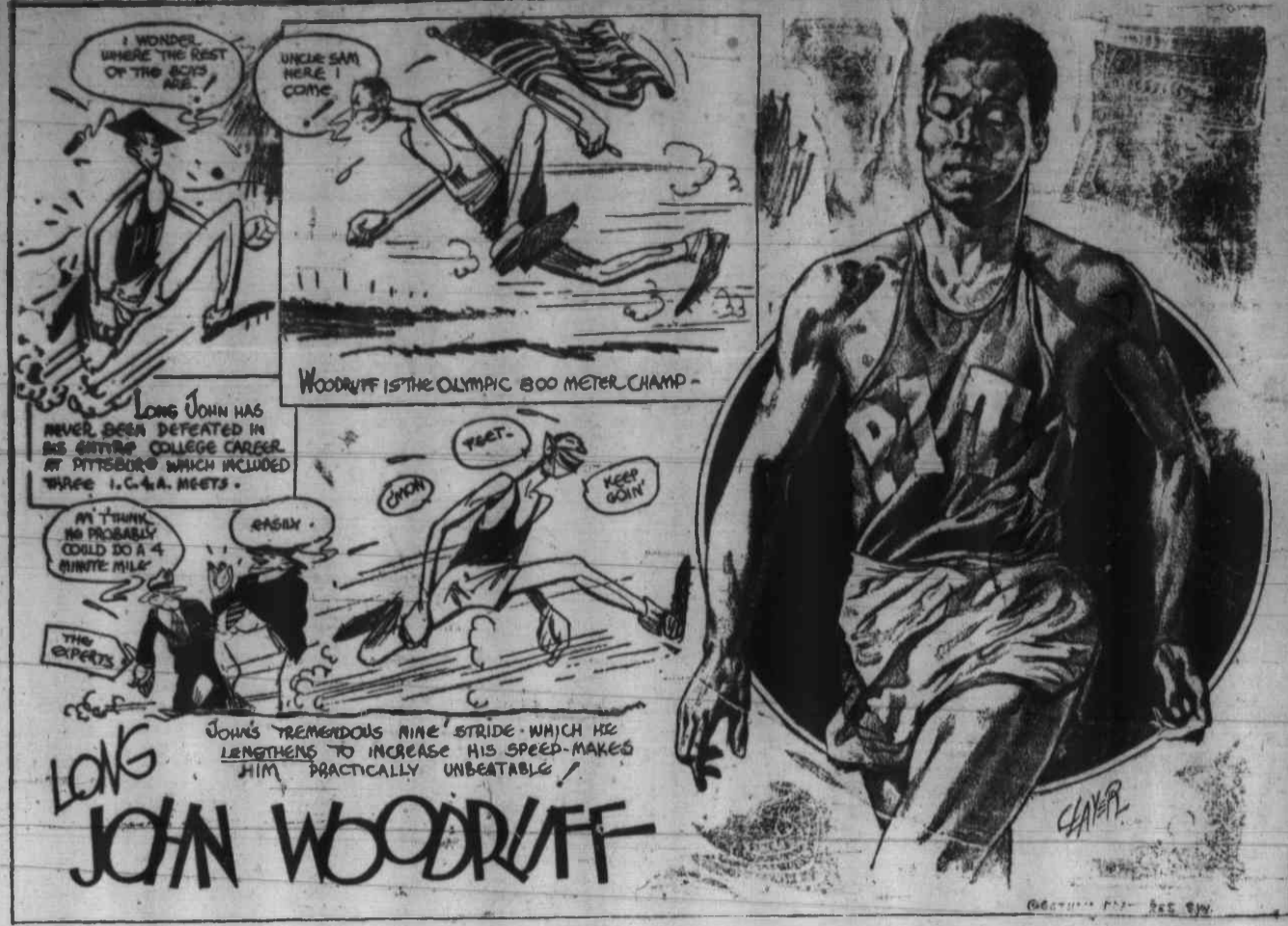

General Information

Headquarters for the Aquatic School will be the North Carolina College for Negroes in Durham, North Carolina and excellent facilities are being provided for feeding and housing the Aquatic School students. Separate dormitories will be available for men and women students and each group will be under the personal supervision of an experienced dean of men and dean of women. Swimming pool and other aquatic facilities are being provided by the Durham Recreation Commission

and are adequate for all the courses.

Health And Safety

Physical activity and rest in proper balance for every individual are considered of essential importance in the maintenance of health. The college physician and nurse will be a part of the faculty group and available for advice and assistance to students on matters of health. A physician from the National Red Cross Staff will also be available and will have charge of all First Aid instruction.

At the conclusion, or near it, those who have taken part in

the school will present a water pageant at Hillside Pool.

Officials Arrive Saturday

American Red Cross national instructors will arrive in Durham Saturday and complete their arrangements for the school which is to be held at Hillside Park, and the old pump station on Eno River, as well as at the College.

No swimming will be done at Eno, because of the condemnation of the place by the health authorities. The boating and canoeing will be held there July 4, 6, 8 and 9.

cause to my knowledge, they were never sent back to the Board signed. Again, the Board says that "all teachers have been paid their full salaries and the only remaining indebtedness are a few small bills" — unquote. I do not know just what they call "small bills," but most likely it would be very interesting for the people of the Second Episcopal District to investigate that in order to get an idea just how small Kittrell College's indebtedness is. The Chairman of the Board own statement was, sometime ago, that he had ten thousand dollars involved there. I am sure he would like to get his money some day, unless he is giving it as a donation, which I doubt very seriously. That may be however, one of the so-called "small bills" of indebtedness, but may be he would not worry about that. There is, or was around three thousand dollars due our Fiscal Agent which he was kind enough to lend. Perhaps that has been settled, if not, it is just another "small bill." The Vance Lumber Company of Henderson, N. C. would like to have a check for about five hundred dollars there, and there are others, my friends. If all teachers have been paid their full salaries, it is a fine thing, but we regret that some went to court in order to get it.

Maybe these bills are small to the Board, but I would shudder to think of thousands upon thousands of dollars being called small, especially when we consider the sources from whence it comes. It may be interesting to the reader to know that not one penny of the money raised for Educational purposes to my knowledge as such has ever come through the President's office, not even the figures of the amounts raised. You do not wonder then that I am not in position to know some other things. Instead, I was even requested to deposit all monies collected from students and all other sources in the bank in the name of Bishop M. H. Davis, which I did with the exception of that which I felt I had to reserve for emergencies. It has

always seemed to me that school monies should be deposited in the school's name.

The "disorders" referred to in the Afro American are vague to you and probably do not make sense. So, permit me to say that much of the trouble centered around ten girls who were suspended at Kittrell College by the Discipline Committee and approved by the President. This action was taken after the girls had failed to appear in a play which was to have been given in our auditorium in December, thereby greatly disappointing the public who had come, some of them from other cities, paid the admission fee and sitting comfortably awaiting for the intended play to begin. The play did not go on, and the girls were suspended for a period of twenty five days. There were some who wondered why they got off with so light a punishment, but the Chairman and the Board seemed to have thought it was terrible. One of the suspended girls sent Bishop M. H. Davis a special delivery letter. I believe most educators, if they had received this letter as the Bishop most likely did, would have sent it or a copy of it back to the President if it contained anything with reference to the action of this committee and we have reasons to believe that it did not so in this case however, perhaps it was too precious. At any rate, in a very short time, the Bishop sent the President a letter ordering that these girls be placed back in class immediately; that two members of the Discipline committee be removed, and also that one teacher be asked for her resignation.

The President did none of these and gave his reasons. It appeared to the President that any man making such a drastic request would have at least, if interested in the discipline of the school (which duty is that of a President and his faculty), sought the reasons why the students were suspended first, and then if there had been any just cause for retraction, in his opinion, would have made a request for it, with the President and his discipline com-

mittee and with some sort of reason attached. The loyal members of our faculty and especially the Discipline Committee were never going to be kicked around by students, and that is most likely what would have been attempted if they had gotten back in school that way. They stayed out and not a one of us; unless it is the Dean of women, regret the action. I am referring of course, especially to the Discipline Committee and the President.

Don't overlook this fact — all members of this Discipline Committee, including the President are now away from Kittrell College, except one the Dean of women — why? We gave the Chairman and the Board a record in part which states that she did not co-operate, (this record coming from the school with which she was connected prior to her coming to Kittrell College), but her name is not in the number you read, which those Board members members said were fired. She told one of our faculty members that if he wanted to be on the side of power to come on her side. So, there you are, kind reader. I had told the Bishop several months ago that I did not think he would be doing wrong if he would allow my faculty and me to operate, especially the academic side of the institution, and because of this as I understood him; and perhaps other reasons, he decided not to recommend me for reelection, a recommendation of course, which I did not want and told him so. Now, in all seriousness can you imagine any one else operating the academic side of any school unless it is the President and his faculty? When, from 13 to 15 out of 18 faculty members leave a school in one year, you know something would seem to be wrong. When so many of its students leave in one year, you may know they have other plans and you cannot, therefore, blame them for desiring to graduate at an accredited institution. We are sorry to tell you that Kittrell College as such, has no state rating.

Concluding this article, I am not unmindful of the fact that

the last six years, this school has operated, three presidents and scores of teachers have been employed. That is an average of two years for each president. Yes, two years seem to be quite enough under any such conditions. I had not hoped that the session would arise when I would be forced to go into this matter, but if the public must be informed it should know the truth.

another Negro by the name of Tom Diekens who resides at 970 Gay street. At the June German last year Vaughn beat another Negro by the name of Dorsey Battle and followed it with beating another by the name of Ellis, William Ellis during last February.

In a long distance telephone conversation with the Chief of Police of Rocky Mount it was denied to a representative of the CAROLINA TIMES that Vaughn struck Rev. Mason, even in the face of the fact that the young minister showed a knot on his head the size of a hen egg.

An attempt by the father of the young man to wear out a warrant for the officer was of no avail, and only resulted in a refusal by the police department. Attorneys for the young man have been secured and it is believed that some action will be taken at an early date. In addition the newspapers of the city, have refused to print any account of the assault.

Negroes traveling in the vicinity of Rocky Mount are warned to evade going through there if possible. Those having business to attend to in the city are urged to get out as quickly as possible, as the least infringement of laws governing the city, may result in brutality by members of the police force.
