Divine Holding \$262,000 In Upstate N. Y.

NEW YORK—Holdings of Father Divine and his "angels" acquired in Ulster county, Kingston and nearby towns, since 1935, are estimated at being worth \$212,000 and is estimated that \$50,000 more has been spent in improvements making a total valuation of \$262,000, according to a front page feature article in the Herald Tribune Monday morning. It is believed the properties, some twenty five in number were bought for a total of \$213,000.
