FOOD MARKET
THERE seems to be a general stiffening of prices throughout the perishable food field, not enough to call things high but a general reaction from recent extreme lows.

Lamb Much Higher
LAMB prices have reacted much more than other meats, enough to noticeably affect retail. Although HINDQUARTER BEEF is higher, STEAKS are still moderate in price and FOREQUARTER CUTS reasonable. PORK retails up last week but have remained steady since. VEAL continues to be frankly high in price. FOWL is priced at about the same level except where specials are listed.

Fish Prices Moderate
FISH is somewhat more plentiful this week and prices are generally moderate. There is a tendency for EGGS to be a little higher, because of government buying and diversion into storage, though they are still a cheap food. CHEESE just naturally seems to go with eggs in omelets, souffles, frittatas and sauces and these dishes make delicious Luncheon fare. BUTTER continues to be reasonable.

Spinach Cheap, Abundant
SPINACH is not only the cheapest vegetable on the market but it is also the most abundant. It can be used in soup and salads in addition to the vegetable ways to serve it as a vegetable, chopped, buttered, creamed, with onions, vinaigrette, in timbales or souffles, as well as poached in soup stock, or with a variety of sauces. APPARATUS is still the most expensive vegetable. TOMATOES, BEANS and PEAS are intermediate, CABBAGE, CARROTS, CELERY and LETTUCE reasonable and POTATOES are cheap.

Citrus Fruits and Apples Still Good Value
ORANGES, GRAPEFRUIT and APPLES are still plentiful, of good quality and very reasonable in price. PINEAPPLES are becoming more plentiful. STRAWBERRIES continue to be reasonable, shipments from Louisiana have begun to supplement those from Florida. MELONS and GRAPES from South America and South Africa are entering the country in considerable volume. Here is a menu made up of reasonable foods: Grapefruit Juice, Broiled Chicken with Mushrooms, New Potatoes, Spinach and Gratin, Bread and Butter, Ice Cream with Crushed Strawberries, Tea or Coffee, Milk.
