-By Frances Loc Barto BREAKPAST is more likely to become a routine meal than either lunch or dinner. In the well - ordered home this is not true: New breakfast dishes con-



2% cups sifted cake flour; 2%

Sift four once, measure, add baking powder, salt, and sugar, and aift again. Cut in shortening. Combine egg and milk; add all at once to four mixture and stir until all flour is dampened. Then stir vigorously until mixture forms a soft dough and follows spoon around bowl. Turn eut on slightly floured board and kneed 39 seconds. Roll into oblong sheet, 'A inch thick; brush with melted butter and sprinkle with mixture of brown sugar, clinamon, nuts, raisins, and orange rind. Roll as for jelly roll; bring edges together to form ring and place on ungreased baking sheet. With scissors, cut 1-inch allows, amount of the cut-side up and pointing outer edges. There is hot oven (400° P.) 25 minutes, or until done. Remove to cake rack and while hoft spread with glase made by combining 1 cun afted canfectioners' sugar and 2 tablespoons milk (about). Serve warm or cold.
