## Death Ends Aid Grant To 4692 Carolinians

RALEIGH, N. C.—Death terminated the government grants of 19 North Carolinians 100 years old or more during the fiscal year ending in June. Nathan H. Yelton, State Director of public assistance announced this week.

Figures compiled by J. S. Kirk, statistician for the State of Charities and Public Welfare, disclosed a total of 4,692 public assistance cases closed during the year with death being the reason assigned to the 1,827 men and 1,511 women marked off the lists.

Oldest of the 19 Tar Heel centenarians to die was Sarah Gudenager, Negro woman of Asheville, who received a government grant for the last 16 months of 122 years of life. Majority of those dying were between the ages of 80 and 83, the figures showed.

One hundred and seventeen old people became self supporting during the year, while 200 were admitted to public institutions and the relatives of 413 more assumed responsibility for their care.

One hundred and thirty one persons never received a government grant before death closed their case on the rolls, while 19 received their payments from combined Federal, State and county funds for two years or more before their death.

## J. C. SMITH PROFESSOR TO APPEAR ON PROGRAM AT INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS



Dr. R. L. Anderson, Professor of Biology and Chairman of the Division of Mathematics and Sciences at Johns Hopkins University sails on the steamship Georgia on August 5th for Edinburgh, Scotland where he will appear on the program of the International Congress of Genetics.

Dr. Anderson holds the Bachelor, Master and PhD degree he has done some very outstanding work at the Marine Biological Laboratories, Woods Hole, Mass. In recognition of this high quality work which he has done he has been asked to present his findings before this International Congress.

In the field of Biology, Dr. Anderson is an outstanding scholar. He has written several articles which have appeared in various scientific magazines. He has also written a number of articles in collaboration with other eminent Biologists. He is a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Genetic Society of America and Sigma Xi Honorary Scientific Society. Dr. Anderson is the first Negro to have had the honor of appearing before this International Congress.
