him to wait patiently until that which he desires is given him. Such a pattern of thinking, Rev. Miller said is contrary to the experiences of all historical races, for all races which wait to be given human rights and opportunities are long lost in the deep shadows of the past.

The outspoken minister who is also an outstanding civic leader in the community, further said that no international court or interracial commission possesses powers sufficient to give the Negro or any race any privileges or powers. They must be won the hard way, with sacrifice and agony, he said.

Rev. Miller finally admonished the graduating group to live up to the requirements of leadership by sacrificing all desires for personal gain and self promotion in the little of our idea democracy.

They are still registering.
