skilled workers of all kinds. From all indications the demand for such workers will increase rather than decrease when a start of some noticeable proportions has been made toward satisfying the demand which now exists. Training of Negroes along technical lines has been so neglected for a generation or more that it is now difficult to find a skilled tradesman among Negroes who is under 35 years of age in fact, there are but a few under 35 years of age. This is a condition which if not corrected will soon eliminate the Negro from the skilled tradesman field.

It is gratifying to note that the differentials in our educational system, both sectional and racial are receiving more attention than ever before. In 1936 the average expenditure by states throughout the country was \$99.00 for each pupil. The expenditure for white children in the South however was \$44.31, less than half of the national average. The average expenditure for Negro children was \$12.67. Inadequ-

ate education for all particularly for the Negro is the cause of most of the problems of the South so the question which confronts all of us is: What can be done to remedy conditions? Let us see to it first that our homes supply the moral, Christian influence for our children that they should. Let us keep ever before us the fact that the young man or young woman who enters upon the responsibilities of life without proper adequate training, is hopelessly handicapped from the start. What the world demands today is efficiency. Without training and skill, regardless of our chosen field of endeavor, ignorance and inefficiency will keep us chained to the country's lowest strata.

As I live, work and acquire more experience; I come to believe more and more in the sane and sound teachings of the late Booker T. Washington. Of his many utterances the following impresses me as being most timely at this stage of our economic development: 'We shall not succeed by abstract discussions, not by depending upon making demands not by

started beating him in the elevator car, and ended the vicious attack by striking Jones again with his black jack after he had reached the jail cell door, Jones falling sprawling out and bleeding in his cell.

Jones has lived in Durham for 17 years, coming here from Robeson county he has worked consistently for the express company here for six years. He has never been arrested before and is considered a hard working respectable man. Morgan as stated above is well known in the bootlegging and rum running racket. He was placed on the ABC squad over the protest of many decent white and Negro citizens of Durham. Since being on the squad he has terrorized the Negro section of the city by running his car at from 60 to 70 miles an hour through Fayetteville and Pettigrew streets two of the most congested thoroughfares in the city. In addition he has reported to the most vicious methods in making arrests of Negroes.

All officers of the ABC board of Durham county are appointed by a committee members of John Harris as chairman; J. O. Cobb and Fyatt Dixon.

Hearing for Jones is scheduled to be held Friday morning in the Recorders Court. Former Lieutenant Governor Elmer P. Long has been employed to represent Jones.
