IN NEW YORK Miss Connie M. Truitt left Durham Saturday night August 26, for a short vacation in New York City. She expects to return next Friday.

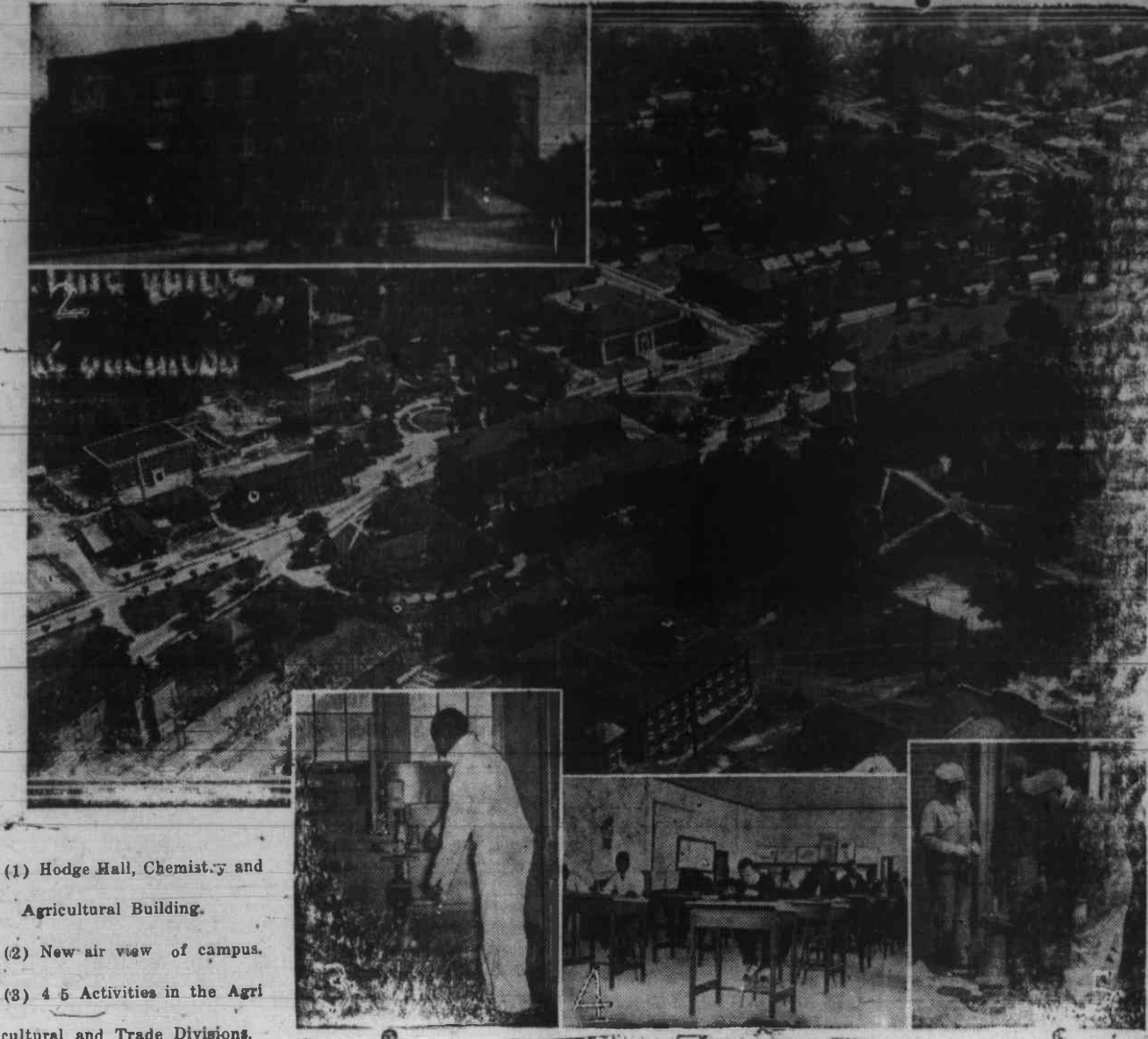
