

# J. C. SMITH U. OPENS 72ND SESSION

## Big Enrollment Expected At Charlotte Inst.

CHARLOTTE.—Johnson C. Smith University opened its doors for the seventy second consecutive year here on Tuesday morning, with a large freshman enrollment. Registering started about the same as last year, according to school officials, but indications are that enrollment this year will be the largest in history.

All new students were slated to register on Tuesday while returning students registered Wednesday. Monday was given over to Placement tests for Freshmen, the Mathematics and French Placement test being given in the morning followed in the afternoon by the English Placement Test. On Tuesday evening a reception was given at the University Refectory at which time the Freshmen were introduced to the members of the faculty. Two new instructors have been appointed to the faculty, R. E. Carroll, in the English Department, and Miss Evelyn Hughes in the department of Education.

The Formal Opening of the Seventy Second Session of the University was slated for Thursday morning at ten o'clock with the address to be delivered by Dr. Rudolph M. Wycha, practicing local physician and an alumnus, class of 1921. His subject will be, "The Power of Determination." Classes are scheduled to begin on Thursday afternoon at two o'clock. Other features include a reception on Thursday evening by the Local Alumni Association for the Freshmen, instruction in the use of the University Library by T. L. Gunn, librarian; interpretation of the various Camps activities and a free picture at the Grand Theater across the street from the campus.

Extensive alterations and remodeling have been completed, the only unfinished building being the ninety thousand dollar girl's dormitory which is expected to be ready for occupancy by the end of the first semester.
