

PASTOR OBSERVES 25th ANNIVERSARY

Charlotte Church Has 700 Members



The Mount Carmel Baptist church in the Biddleville section of Charlotte, which for the past twenty five years has been pastored by the Rev. W. H. Davidson. Rev. Davidson built the church during its pastorate, and now the church is debt free.

CHARLOTTE—Rev. W. H. Davidson, pastor of the Mount Carmel Baptist Church, celebrates this month his twenty fifth anniversary as pastor. This church was organized over fifty years ago at which time the late Rev. William Davidson, father of the present pastor took part in the organization.

Rev. Davidson was called in 1914 to this church which consisted of eighty five members and four deacons at the time. In 1917 he launched upon a program for a building of the present brick edifice which was completed a few years later and the mortgage was lifted in 1923. In 1933 another program was begun which resulted in the building of the Sunday School annex which is now paid for. Today the present church has a membership of about 700 members, 10 deacons and 11 organizations.

Rev. Davidson has taken an active interest in the various organizations of his field. He is president of the Sunday School convention, secretary of the Mt. Pease Association an chairman of the executive board of the Educational Union.

He has been greatly assisted in his work by his wife, Mrs. Florence G. Davidson, whom he married in 1918, four years after Carmel. He two children, Mary Willie Davidson and Evelyn Davidson, who are now seniors at Johnson C. Smith University are also a great asset to the church.

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ANTHONY BUCKNER POLICE WAR VETERAN DIES

NEW YORK, (C)—A veteran of the World, Anthony Buckner, well known patrolman attached to the 34nd Precinct Police Station in Harlem, died early Wednesday morning, Oct. 25th at Harlem Hospital following a surgical operation. A few years ago he had suffered a broken leg when he run down by a taxicab. It was an operation on the same wound that caused his death. Patrolman Buckner saw service overseas with the Old Fifteenth Infantry, now the 369th Regiment. While still a member of the regiment's veterans, he joined the police department on December 12, 1927. Patrolman Buckner was 39 year old.
