San Antonio Gets Sunday School Meet

HISTORICAL "ALAMO CITY" TO BE HOST TO THOUSANDS OF RELIGIOUS CONFAB

Cradle of Texas Liberty Forges Ahead of All Other Cities Bidding for National Meeting—First National Wide Gathering to be Held Within Its Gates...

SAN ANTONIO Texas (Special)—This historical city, known as the "Cradle of Texas Liberty" has just been awarded the 1940 session of the Sunday School Congress. The invitation was extended by the churches of this city, under the leadership of the Rev. D. Manning Jackson, pastor of the First Baptist church, located at the corner of North Hackberry and Nebraska streets. Telegraphic information reached here as confirmation of the awards, from Rev. Henry Allen Boyd, secretary of this nation wide movement, at Nashville, Tenn. He had just returned from a visit to this "Alamo City," where he had been the guest speaker at a Thanksgiving and Dedicatory Service, and where he was greeted by His Honor, Mayor Maury Maverick, by the Postmaster, by the leading business men and ministers of all denominations. Thus, the award of the Sunday School Congress climaxed a two year effort on the part of the Baptists of this west Texas town, to bring a national meeting to the most picturesque city in all the southland. It will be the fortieth annual gathering, and for all these years, Henry Allen Boyd, who is a former San Antonian, has served as its secretary, his guiding spirit, and is known far and wide as the Sunday School Wizard, and the Religious Dynamo, due to the fact that he has travelled extensively in the United States and abroad.

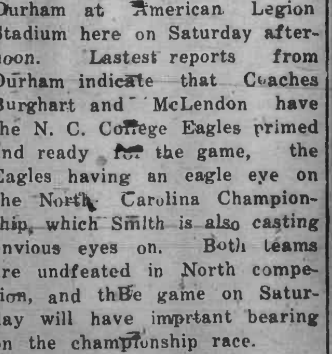

6,000 Fans Will Be Present

RECORD CROWD WILL VIEW SMITH'S HOMECOMING GAME AND OTHER FESTIVITIES

CHARLOTTE, N. C.—More than six thousand persons, a record crowd for a local game played by Johnson C. Smith University is expected to view Smith's Homecoming Classic with North Carolina College of Durham at American Legion Stadium here on Saturday afternoon. Latest reports from Durham indicate that Coaches Burghart and McLendon have the N. C. College Eagles primed and ready for the game, the Eagles having an eagle eye on the North Carolina Championship, which Smith is also casting envious eyes on. Both teams are undefeated in North competition, and the game on Saturday will have important bearing on the championship race.

CANDIDATE FOR BISHOP.

Niles Says No Jim Crowism To Be Practiced

NEW YORK, (Special)—There will be no discrimination in regard to race, sex or religion in the selection of applicants for jobs with the Census Bureau, David K. Niles, Assistant to Secretary of Commerce Harry Hopkins, assured the National Urban League this week.

In a letter to T. Arnold Hill, Director of the League's Department of Industrial Relations, Mr. Niles outlined the procedure to be followed by those wishing to obtain employment as stenographers, clerks, interpreters and enumerators in the Census Bureau when it begins to expand early next year in preparation for the taking of the 1940 Census.

Civil Service status, he said, will NOT be necessary for persons working in the field (outside of Washington, D. C.) but the Census Bureau will give its own examinations to determine the relative qualifications of applicants.

Mr. Niles emphasized that persons desiring to apply for the positions named above should not write to Washington, because all jobs in the field will be filled locally. Applicants, he said, should wait until local offices are established at the close of the present year, and then apply to the office nearest their home for blanks and general information concerning employment. The opening of each local office will be announced in the newspapers.

The selection of District Supervisors to direct the work of the 560 district offices now under way. Applications for positions of this type, and for administrative positions in the Washington office, should be addressed to the Director of the Census, Washington. Only those who are exceptionally well prepared for the work to be accepted for appointment.

Men and women will be eligible for Census work on equal terms, Mr. Niles said. War veterans or their widows will be given special preference when equally qualified with others.

Band And Grid Squad to Don New Uniforms At Hillside Homecoming

DURHAM, N. C. (By William "Smiling" Tucker)—When the festivities are under way for homecoming day at Hillside Park high school, Friday afternoon, Nov. 11, and the football squad will come out in brand new royal blue and white uniforms.

The band uniforms which cost approximately \$415 came as the result of a two weeks' drive among the students and members of the faculty which netted more than \$300. The uniform consists of blue capes with white linings. Blue overseas caps complete the uniform. For the drum major there is a drum major's coat with white braid across the front.

The football team also has royal blue suits with shining satin pants which have white stripes.

GALA PARADE PLANNED

A main feature of Hillside's homecoming day Friday will be the parade in which students, faculty and civic groups will take part. More than a score of floats have been registered for the parade and the most attractive ones promise to be those which are being decorated by the various competing classes and clubs of the school. All of the colored safety patrols of the city will take part in the parade and will be led by the well trained group from Hillside. There will also be a bicycle Brigade in the parade.

This parade is scheduled to leave the school at one o'clock and will end at North Carolina College park, the scene of the game, about an hour later. The game has been set for 2:30.

Queen of the day will be Miss Katherine Toole, a charming member of the Junior class whom the boys of the school elected as Miss Homecoming. She will be crowned at the intermission between halves.
