CARNEGIE GROUP VISITS SOUTH

NEW ORLEANS, A N P.—A survey conducted under the direction of the Carnegie corporation to ascertain the actual status of the negro in American civilization wound its way into New Orleans this week by way of a special group headed by Dr. Ralph Bunche, professor of political science at Howard university; Dr. Gunner Myrdal, social scientist of Stockholm, Sweden and former member of Sweden's parliament, and Richard B. Whitney, prominent publicist and sociological expert.

## Trent Sneaks At Livingstone

SALISBURY, N. C.—W. J. Trent, Jr. Special Advisor on Negro Affairs to the Works Progress Administration, speaking before the student body of Livingstone College, expressed his belief that the existing inconsistencies of the American democracy can be minimized through concerted action and a "singleness of purpose" on the part of Negroes.

The federal official climaxed the celebration of Negro Achievement Week, sponsored by Omega Psi Phi fraternity, with his declaration of faith in American democracy.

Mr. Trent recognized the many situations, historical and current, which have operated create fissures in the democratic system, but he asserted that "it is clearly patent that for a minority group, there is actually no other alternative which will maintain the dignity of the human personality." The federal advisor reviewed the list of fundamental demands which the demands which the democratic system implies the chiefest of which is the freedom of the individual, implied by freedom of the individual we make a mockery of our democracy.
