MISS LILIAN ESPY VISITOR

Miss Lillian Espy staff member of the National Board of the Young Women's Christian Associations in New York who is particularly interested in the work of the personal bureau, was a visitor at the YWCA the weekend of December first. The Executive Board met her at lunch on Saturday, December 2. At this time a discussion was on unique corresponsibility of the Volunteer and employed staff for the YWCA program and the importance of leadership in the movement. On Friday at 3 o'clock she worked with volunteers of the Harriet Tubman Branch. Miss Espy also conferred with members of the personnel committee relative to local job analyses, and professional standards.

Miss Espy has been placement secretary for business and industrial secretaries for a greater part of her service with the national organization since 1929. She is well acquainted with the large group of young women who are holding these positions in all parts of the country. In line with her placement work she has been keenly interested in the broader aspects of occupational opportunities for women and the relationship between vocational possibilities in the YWCA and other fields. No small part of her work is participation in discussion groups and conferences where personnel standards and qualifications are under consideration. She is also interested in conferring with YWCA boards and those volunteer workers who have the responsibility of recruiting staff members for community associations, interpreting the need for proper training and personal equipment and developing personnel committees with an understanding of the need for a high quality of leadership in the YWCA.

Before joining the national staff Miss Espy spent three and a half years as a community worker in a New York City settlement under the auspices of the Episcopal church. She received a master of arts degree from Teachers' College, Columbia University in personnel after graduating from Washington State College. She was born in Iowa, living there through her high school days when she went to the Northwest. In conjunction with her professional work on the national level she has served as a volunteer worker for the New York City YWCA as a volunteer worker.

St. Arthur Anderson was a guest speaker for the evening. His subject was "Facts about employees." He gave some very fine points a few of them were "Cooperation of the employees," "Fear your responsibility," and "Do your job well." Perry Davis was toast master for the affair. 45 employees attended the banquet.
