GREENSBORO. — The date set for the dedication of the Richard B. Harrison auditorium and Alexander Graham hall, two new buildings at A and T college, is Sunday, January 21, it was announced by President F. D. Bluford last week. The principal address will be delivered by Dr. Porter Graham, president of the Greater University of North Carolina. Distinguished educators from this and other states will also take part in the dedicatory program. Dr. Graham during his tenure as president of the state university has won national acclaim as one of the country's leading educators. His position as a liberal finds him in complete agreement with the steps now being taken by A and T college to become one of the leading schools in the country devoted in agriculture and industry. The new Richard B. Harrison auditorium is considered one of the best equipped buildings of its type in the south. It will seat 1400 persons and is complete with dressing rooms, back-stage for both male and female members of a concert or drama-
