Celebrates Anniversary

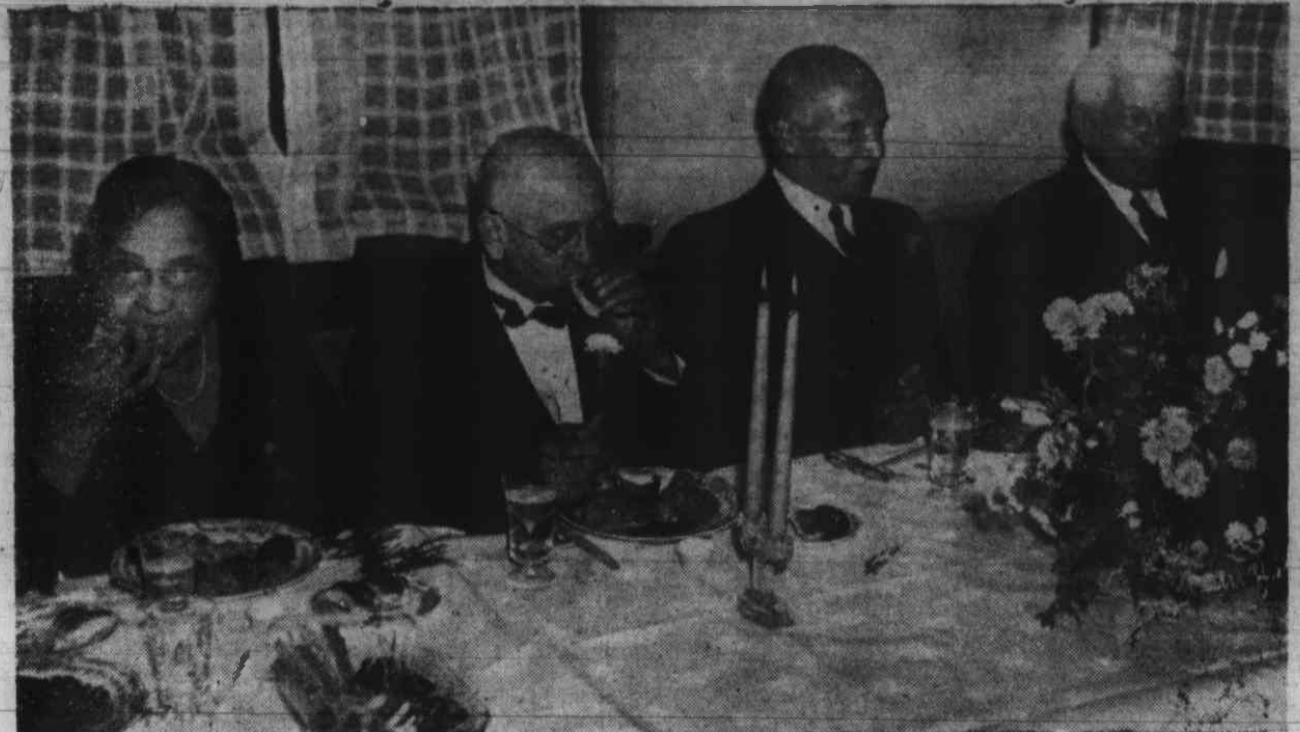
MR. AND MRS. JOHN H. BETTS a socially prominent young couple of the city celebrated their 2nd wedding anniversary on January 25, 1940.

RALEIGH, N. C. — Inspite of the weather, music lovers filled Greenleaf Chapel at Shaw University on Friday night, Jan. 26 with the local Zeta Phi Beta Sorority to listen and thrill to vibrations that hurried through the ear to get to the heart; to a voice of pure gold that tugged at the heart strings; enjoy charm for the year, pleasure for the eye and food for the emotions.

By her charm and grace of presentation Evanti, sensationally projected her personality over the footlights to captivate the audience in passionate rendition of some of the best loved compositions. The whole hearted acceptance by the audience and the excited applause as her voice of amazing range and accuracy thrilled in encore after encore, hesitating in stopping even when the lights were turned on; not wanting to leave after three encores climaxed the program and the lights were turned on.

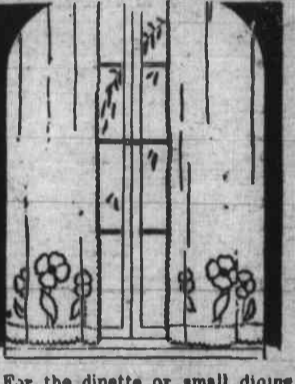

Quick CHICKEN PIE with Sweet Potato Biscuit Cover

IF there is anything that braves males and youngsters alike cheer over it is a deep dish main course pie, with hot gravy bubbling through the tender crust.



A new one I have been trying out lately is thick with sweet young carrots and celery in a special gravy made of condensed chicken noodle soup. This gravy has that rich yellow chicken color. It is rich in chicken flavor, too, and tender pieces of chicken meat. Topping the pie are biscuits made with mashed sweet potatoes. It's a lovely dish—and a quick one! This is how it goes:

The Pie Filling: 3 tablespoons butter 1 tablespoon salt 3 cans condensed chicken noodle soup 1 cup water 1/2 cup cooked celery 1 cup cooked carrots 1 teaspoon lemon juice

Melt the butter, then add the other ingredients. Add the chicken noodle soup and water and cook until thickened. Then add the cooked celery, cooked carrots and lemon juice. Put into a casserole dish and cover with "Sweet Potato Biscuits." Serves 6-7.

The Sweet Potato Biscuit Cover: 1 cup flour (sifted) 1/2 cup shortening 1/2 cup milk 1/2 cup water 1/2 cup sweet potato puree 1/2 cup onion puree 1/2 cup carrot puree 1/2 cup celery puree 1/2 cup lemon juice 1/2 cup salt

RADIO EDITORS of the United States and Canada have cast their votes for outstanding programs and air celebrities of the past year in the ninth annual poll conducted by the New York World-Telegram. For the seventh year, Jack Benny (1) emerges as head man of humor, while his program was voted the best on the air.
