

NCC English Prof. Addresses Young Women

DURHAM — In an informal talk to the young women at N. C. College, Miss Pauline Newton of the English Department, advised the cultivation of the art of conversation to increase chances of success in life. Miss Newton gave her views on why people should learn to converse well, what they might converse about and how they should carry on conversation.

"In part the speaker said, conversation is a lost art. Many institutions such as the radio, the movies, the streamlined age in which we live have made it unnecessary to develop into concise. However, one must talk and since one is appraised by his ability to converse intelligible and since it is a part of your equipment in meeting the various social situations in which you find yourself, conversation is an art. 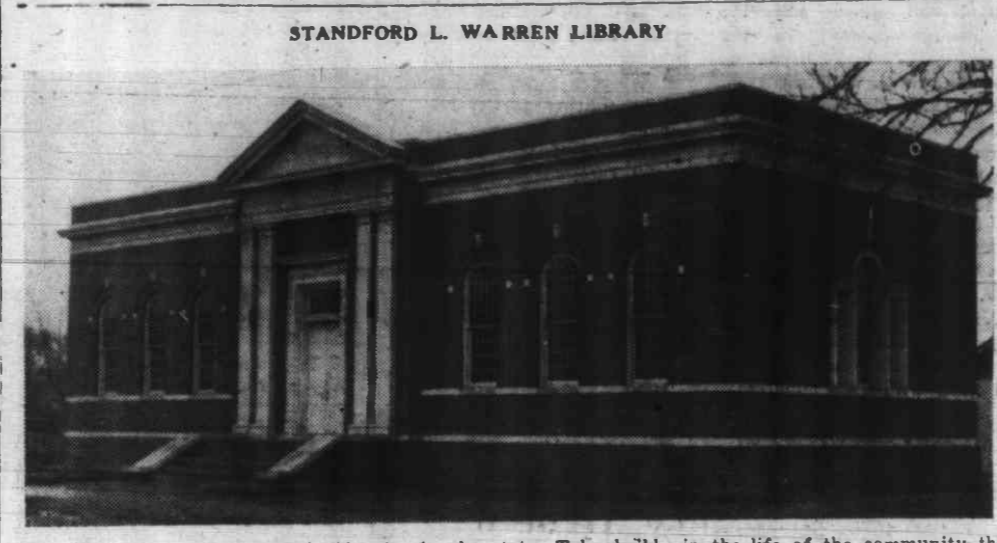

HYDE PARK, N. Y. (CNA) — Mrs. James Van Allen, Socialite of New York and Newport, R. I., has decided to turn over to the U. S. Government the old Frederick W. Vanderbilt estate near this village to prevent it falling into the hands of Father Divine and his followers, President Roosevelt revealed this week. The Newport dowager is the present owner of the estate which comprises some 260 acres of land and a huge mansion.

Ebenezer Baptist Church Of Charlotte Has Large Membership



Rev. H. M. Moore, pastor of the Ebenezer Baptist Church at the corner of Second and David Streets here has developed his large congregation until now the church boasts not only one of the largest memberships in the city, but is one of the best organized.

This united the two congregations in a fellowship which has kept up to the present day.
