

N. C. C. FOR NEGROES ANNOUNCES SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAM JUNE 7th

First Session June 7 to July 17

DURHAM — During the past ten days, summer school posters have been published and distributed among more than two hundred schools in the state of North Carolina calling attention to the summer school offerings at the North Carolina College for Negroes during the summer of 1940.

The session title which has been chosen this year is "A VACATION WITH STUDY." The first session is scheduled for June 7-July 17; while the second session is scheduled from July 18 to August 28.

As is customary undergraduate courses will be offered toward certificate renewal for all students who are not already holders of the bachelor's degree. In addition to this group of students, courses will be set up for credit toward the bachelor's de-

grees in all departments recognized by the Institution.

Graduate courses will be offered in the following departments: Elementary Education, High School Education, Home Economics, Social Sciences, Natural Sciences, Education and Commercial Education.

The capable faculty already at work at the college will be augmented by the addition of several specialists in their respective fields. Thus, the student who studies in Durham is assured of work under a capable faculty with modern facilities and housing in comfortable dormitories.

The President of the college, Dr. James E. Shepard, announces that the undergraduate work of the summer school will be directed by Dr. A. Henningburg.

Issues Labor Pamphlets

NEW YORK CITY — In a pamphlet entitled "A WORKER'S WORLD," prepared especially for its Eighth Vocational Opportunity Campaign, the National Urban League calls the attention of Negroes to the labor union relationship to their vocations. The pamphlet written by Miss Roberts Randolph, Assistant Educational Director of the Laundry Workers' Joint Board of Greater New York, discusses collective bargaining, labor unions, the National Labor Relations Board, Workmen's Compensation, Unemployment Insurance and other social security measures of interest to workers. It is designed to give information to high school and college students on the problems that will confront them as they enter the world of work, and is an unusually valuable pamphlet which ought to be in the hands of all young people about to engage in earning their livelihood.

Senior Employment Counselor in the New York State Employment Service, the leaflet is the vocational guidance literature written especially for Negroes.

Both of these pamphlets may be obtained from the National Urban League, 1133 Broadway, New York City, at forty cents a hundred, three hundred for one dollar. Already several thousand copies have been purchased by Negro schools and Urban League branches for distribution during the Eighth Vocational Opportunity Campaign.

Also available for distribution are two pamphlets in the Color Line Series, "GUIDING NEGRO YOUTH TOWARD JOBS" and "THEY CRASHED THE COLOR LINE," the former outlines programs of vocational guidance, and the latter gives sketches of Negroes who have made outstanding success in a number of vocations.

ABA Adopts New Plan

CHICAGO, (A N P) — Announcement of a master point plan, by which a member may

improve his standing on the ABA's masters' list, was announced this week by the American

Bridge association, the new system to function under a three point program: city, regional and national. Under this plan master points awarded are to be progressively convertible, and a city master may, without competing in a national championship event, become a national master.

Master-point certificates are awarded to ranking participants at the conclusion of all ABA-sanctioned tournaments, according to Porter Davis.
