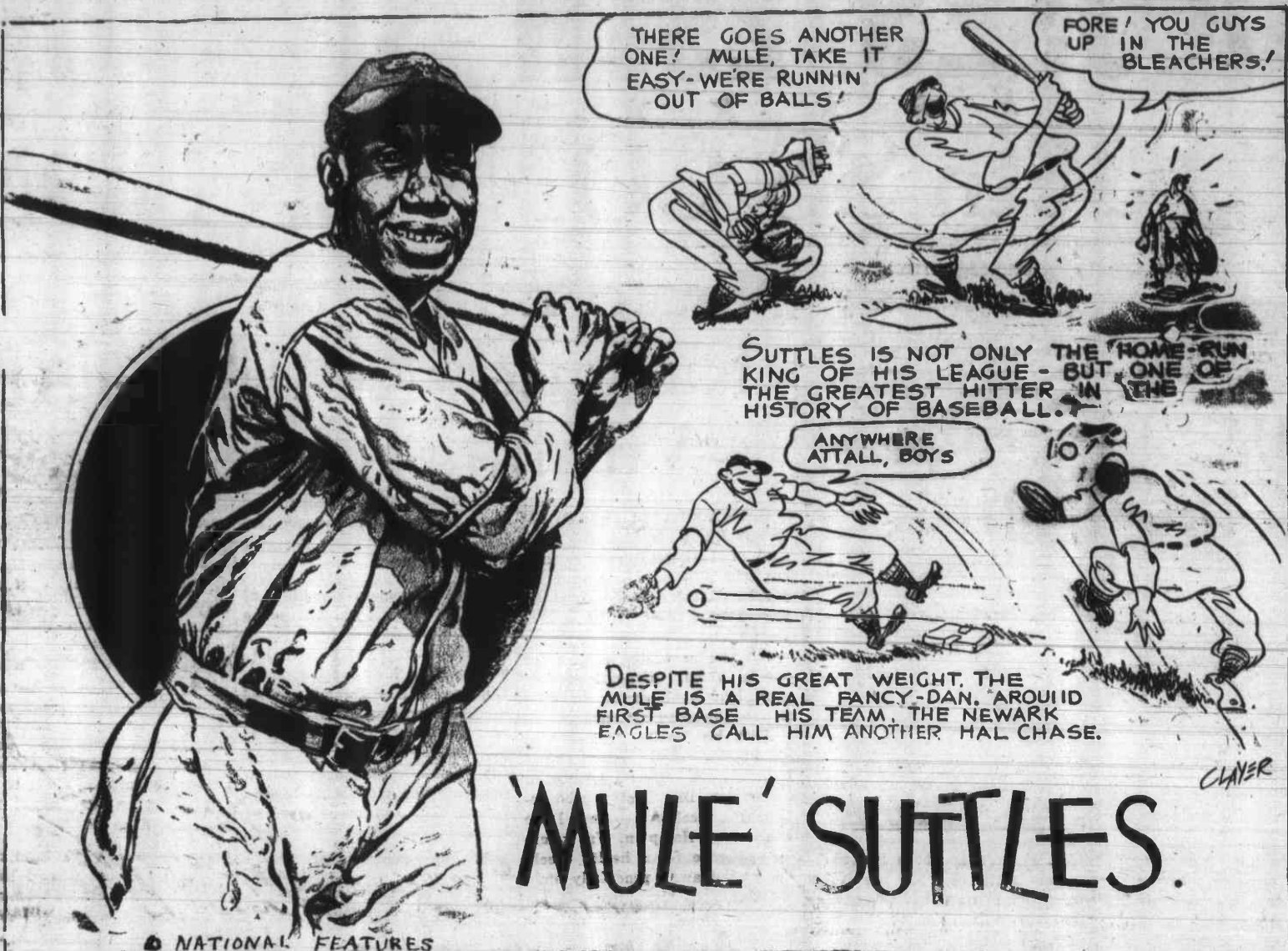

"LUCKY" MILLINDER the dynamic and versatile leader of this famous band, will appear in person in Durham at the City Armory Friday night, June 14th was born in Anniston, Alabama in 1910 and was named Lucius LeRoy Millinder.

Lucky's mother followed the theatrical profession. He inherits his ability from her. His first desire to become a performer was instilled when he drove the car of Percy Venable, a noted Chicago cafe producer, just so he could be in the vicinity and atmosphere of theatrical celebrities.

Originally studied auto mechanics and completed a high school course was quite an athlete and scholar. Made the various basketball, swimming, track and debating teams.

His first attempts in the profession was to produce shows in all of Chicago's best night clubs and theatres. In his first try at producing, Lucky staged the dance routines, designed the costumes, wrote the lyrics, directed the orchestra and kept the show moving rapidly and smoothly by acting as Master of Ceremonies.

Among the celebrities starring in the revue were Ethel Waters, Johnny Hodge, Chas. "Snowball" Whitler, and Nina Mae McKinney. It was in Chicago, in this same revue, Lucky reveals, that he was instilled with a feeling of ease and confidence to perform before huge crowds. Lucky only handled the M. C. because the artist originally slated, failed to show up. So he stepped in to "save his own show" he did—and how! A long line of appearances followed here and abroad it was

the Stormy Weather Revue in the one and only Cotton Club in New York City.

Lucky never goes on the stage until the very last minute claims he loses his pep if he does.

Imagines, while performing before an audience, that he is conducting a rehearsal and the results he states, always have been successful.

Is 5' 6" tall weighs 135 pounds and has black hair his greatest thrill as a child leading a parade with an uncle drum major.

The most exciting incident in his life was the sight of a shark while Lucy was swimming in the Mediterranean Sea. His greatest extravagance is the purchasing of uniforms for his many stage appearances.

His most prized possession is a silver baton given to him by ten orchestra leaders while playing the Rex Theatre, Paris, for symbolizing the peer of swing conductors.

The funniest incident in his life happened in the Cotton Club, when a Frenchman walked to the band stand and coolly and deliberately kissed him on both cheeks for his splendid work before the band.

Lucky likes to be broke because it makes him strive all the harder to succeed claims, despite his nickname, he is naturally unlucky.
