law to teachers of equal training and years of service.

In respect to the method of bringing this about however, there is a wide difference of opinion among the Negro groups. The committee which appeared before the State Commission in 1939 felt that this problem should be solved without court action. As to the method which Negroes in other states wish to pursue in their attempt to settle this issue, I voiced no opinion. I feel that it is a matter of their OWN determination.

This letter is written in order to keep the record straight. It is my philosophy that there can not be any real inter-racial understanding and cooperation built upon a foundation of hypocrisy and dishonesty. Negro leadership, to be effective, must above all things else be honest with both the Negro groups and the white groups. I have insisted time and time again that the era of "Judas-Face" inter-racial dealings is past and that this new era both groups desire an honest, candid and cooperative facing of their mutual problems. It was just such a spirit that characterized the meeting with the School Commission last June at which time I believe the basic for settling our salary difficulties in this state was laid.

I have written you at length and I would appreciate it if you will give this letter some notice in your column.

of the amount of electricity which can be used. A basic charge for electricity will be made against each dwelling unit, but the actual amount used will be checked by check meter, and adjustments will be made in the case of each individual family according to the amount of electricity used.

"No policemen will be stationed on the project to maintain order or in any way to regulate the conduct of the tenants. The tenants of the project will have the same rights and privileges of the inhabitants of any multi-dwelling housing project, who-isto debt in order to buy new aptly or by the government."

"Nothing will be in the windows except glass panes and screens.

"As to the rumor that no one will be admitted except those having new furniture and furnishings, it is absolutely untrue. We shall encourage proper upkeep and furnishings, but we shall discourage any tenant's going into debt in order to buy new furniture which he cannot afford. Of course, the way a tenant spends his money is up to him, but we will have families with lowest incomes, and there won't be much for them to spend on non-essentials."

"J. Frank Hanley restated the eligibility requirements in the tenants in the project. Occupancy will be limited to natural families or cohesive family groups, who must have lived in the city of Charlotte for at least three months prior to time making application. The family must be living under bad housing-ing application. The family income must not exceed the maximums which follow: for two
