

# AQUATIC SCHOOL RETURNS TO DURHAM

## NCC New Indoor Swimming Pool Will Be Used

DURHAM — The second Annual National Aquatic School for Negroes opens at the North Carolina College Sunday, June 30, and will continue through Wednesday, July 10. As this school is sponsored by the American National Red Cross, those attending will share the full benefit of the 18 years experience of the Red Cross in first aid, life saving and accident prevention.

Students entering for the first time will enroll in the basic courses for broad training and practice in the fundamentals of the listed subjects. Second year students will be given advanced training in the same subjects.

Emphasis will be given to swimming and small craft science including the handling of canoes and rowboats in the service of rescue work and other safety technique. All pupils will be instructed in the art of teaching these subjects to others.

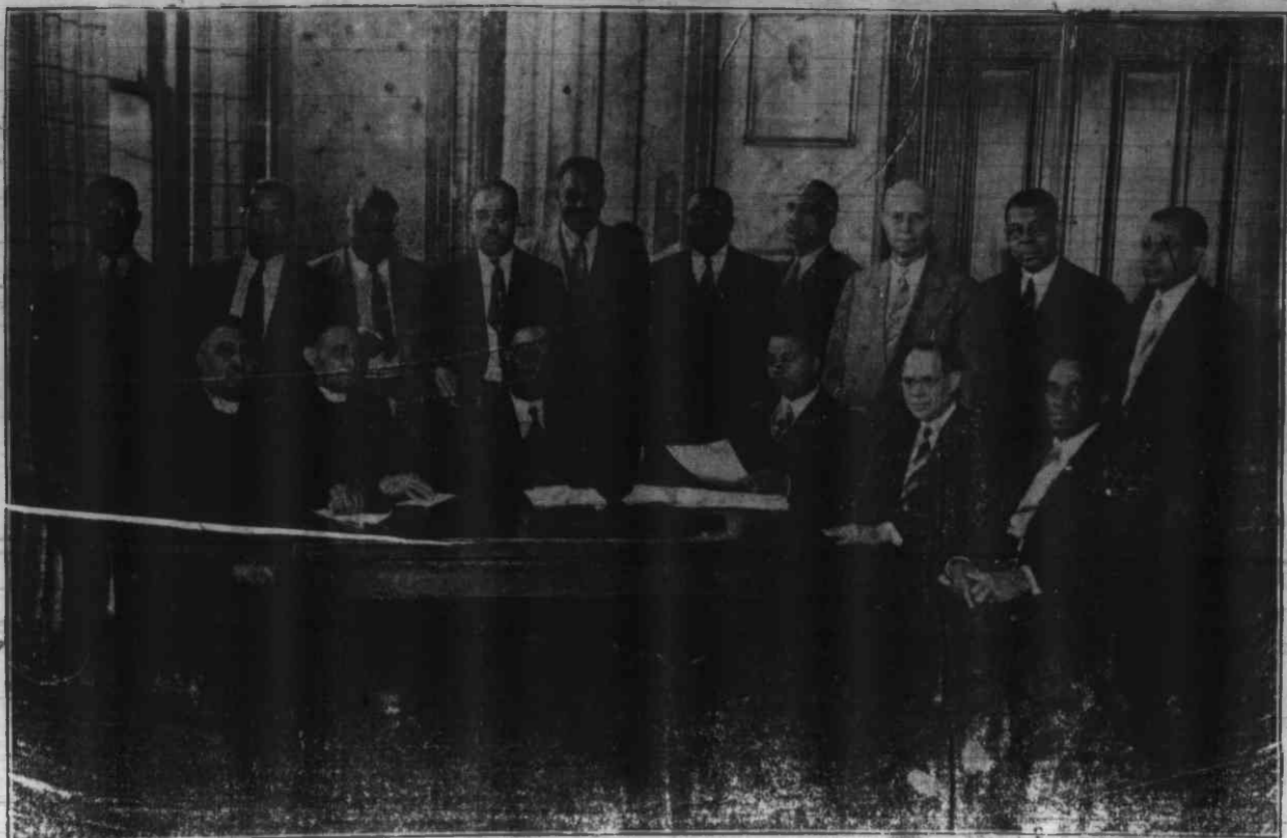
**Pageant To Be Presented**  
During the school a pageant will be written and presented at the indoor pool of the North Carolina College for a demonstration to the public of the art

in water safety. Numbers of lectures will be delivered by specialists on the various subjects connected with the aquatic school. These instructions will be applicable to beaches, summer camps and other recreational resorts.

The Aquatic school faculty will include physicians and dieticians who will care for the health of the students during the ten-day period. All of these will be approved by the National Red Cross.

Reasonable rates have been arranged for the entire session. A charge of \$15 is to be paid upon the day of arrival. This fee covers board and lodging during the entire period of the school, and pays all fees and expenses involved in the session of work. The reasonableness of this fee is due to the cooperation of Doctor James E. Shepard, president of the North Carolina College.

All applications must be signed by the chapter of the Red Cross, and should be forwarded to the Director at the National Headquarters of the American Red Cross at Washington.

## Recreation Inst. Well Attended

DURHAM — The recreation institute which the City of Durham is sponsoring at the North Carolina College for Negroes this week under the supervision of J. W. Davidson has been well attended and as early as Tuesday more than fifty persons had registered. The institute began in Avery Auditorium of the college Monday afternoon and is to continue through Friday, June 28.

This institute is being held for the benefit of all candidates who wish to apply for positions on the playgrounds of city for the summer months. An examination will be given Friday to cover the course given during the week and those appointed

will come from the group attending the institute and making the most successful grades on the examination.

The institute is being directed by J. W. Davidson who has had supervision of the Negro playgrounds of Durham for the past five years. Sessions are held afternoon and night during the week with comprehensive instruction in playground technique including first aid, playground games, handicraft, picture mounting, clay modeling and the essential qualities of a playground leader.

Immediately following registration Monday, Miss Edith Steel, superintendent of nurses at Lincoln Hospital, discussed "First Aid Problems on the Playground." She was followed by Director J. W. Davidson whose subject was "The Playground System of Durham." Tuesday afternoon, Miss Evelyn

Kennedy gave a demonstration modeling and handicraft, after which E. M. Dunlap talked on picture mounting. Mrs. Ethel R. Hubbard's subject at this session was "Handicraft Problems."

Wednesday was devoted to the following discussions and demonstrations: "Playground Games and Clubs," Miss Loris Shaw; "Playground Softball Problems," E. W. Midgette; Playground Musical Organization, Miss Eliza Kennedy and Mrs. Ethel R. Hubbard, and "Hiking and Nature Study," William Edmundson.

Thursday Eugene Harrington will conduct the discussion and exhibitions dealing with tennis, badminton and paddle tennis; J. H. Malloy will have charge of volley ball and demonstrations of similar games, and toward the conclusion of the day's course J. L. Morehead, chairman of the Durham recreation commission will talk about "The Essential Qualities of a Recreation Leader." Examinations will feature Friday.
