Continued from Page One barber and members of the cult for 15 years. Colombos, who arrived in Litchfield with representatives of the cult said:

"The mob had beaten some of the men and pushed the women when suddenly there were cries of lynch them. I thought if it was God's will that we be lynched, we couldn't do anything about it. But there was a Negro standing near me who called out to the mob, 'We're all human. They're human. Let's think this matter over. And that statement stayed the mob's hands until deputies could get there.'" Colombos, 50, said it was the "scariest day of his life."

State police, called from Springfield, arrived and removed the witnesses to Hillsboro county seat of Montgomery county, where they were fingerprinted and permitted to return to St. Louis. The affray in Litchfield began when cult members began to distribute leaflets, containing the statement: "We don't salute the American flag or any other flag." Charges that schools were under the influence of the "Roman Catholic hierarchy" also were contained in the pamphlets.
