At that session, too, a spirited anti war fight was put up against NAACP officials who succeeded in an earlier session in defesting the resolution against conscription adopted by the Youth section. Walter White, National Secre tary of the NAACP, referring to the Association's fight for the

enti lynching measure, said: "The present occupant of the White House has disappointed us by his failure to espouse openly and vigorously the passage of the anti lynching bill."

It was the first time during the 6 day convention that an NAACP official had discussed the plight of the anti lynching bill, and followed by the many delegates' speeches indicating a desire to press harder for Negro
