HOW TO BE YOUR OWN DECORATOR

Gay Summer Pottery & Linens

In speaking of summer decorating, I have been rather stressing the use of outdoor living on porch and terrace and the use of inexpensive gay pottery for a change from your usual china.

Just as you take down heavy curtains and replace them with sheer ones and mullins and take up wool rugs and put down an attractive shag or just scatter rugs for the summer, it is a good plan to put away nice china, glass and linen, as well as silver trays, pitchers, dishes and possibly a tea and coffee set, and substitute yellow, blue, or figured pottery, red or blue glass, an ice tea set, which may come in a convenient tray holder, and the effective tin trays which are to be found pretty generally in shops everywhere.

With this pottery and colored glass, colored table cloths, doilies, and napkins may be used and come in all sorts of materials: paper, straw mats, washable pyroxylin, cellophane, cotton, linen—"novelties" they are often called but by any name they are beguiling and worthy of your attention. As in china and glass, there is something attractive to suit your pocketbook. What you want to consider in purchasing new things or in putting together what you have, is the right combinations. We have Early American furniture of maple, or other light wood, or have walnut or mahogany tables. For place mats that with the yellow tone in the maple, blues and greens, in light tones look well, but in yellow the tone must be strong for pleasant contrast, and that out and out red is better than pale pink. Pink and maple are not good together. The dark woods take any color becomingly—just as beige place mats go anywhere. If you use plain colored mats let your pottery be figured. The pretty foreign wares show figures, flowers and fruits as decorations and the plain mats act as a base to set them off. If, on the other hand, you have figured mats, use plain colored china or even cream or white china. Don't let your table be dizzy with pattern. Balance it carefully. Also be sure that the glass you choose fits the type of china or pottery in color and in form. And perhaps most important of all is to urge that, while you may be gay and frivolous, do not overcrowd. Set each place as it should be set and have an amusing or a lovely centerpiece (which often may be both), but organize your table so that you keep masses together. That is, let your centerpiece be a unit with the bare table between it and the ends of the table, and each place a unit. Don't have an odd lot of small candy dishes or too many salt and pepper. Table setting is an art really and requires a little thought and with taste many charming schemes may be evolved! With pottery plates there are pottery figures which at lunch may replace candlesticks on each side of a bowl of flowers or of fruit.

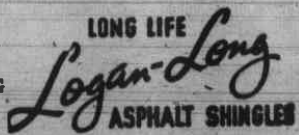

Two Held For Ins. Slaying

DUNN, N. C. (ANP) — Two men are being held in jail here in connection with the alleged insurance slaying of two children who were burned to death at Erwin last week. The suspects, John Holden and O'Dell McNeill, were held after an extensive investigation led police to believe that foul play had occurred in the fatal fire.

The victims, Eddie Stokes, Jr., and Charles, his brother, 3, were burned when their bed clothing caught fire. Their sister, Lois, 9, was critically burned and is in a hospital. Their father, Melvin, is serving a term in prison.

mother, Frances Stokes, also was burned in trying to extinguish the flames.

Investigation revealed that each of Stokes children was insured for \$100 in effect since June 17. The children were burned when a kerosene lamp was knocked off a table and drenched their clothing with oil, which became ignited. No satisfactory explanation has been given as to how the lamp was knocked off. The children were sleeping on a pallet on the floor. Their father, Melvin, is serving a term in prison.
