Elites Swing

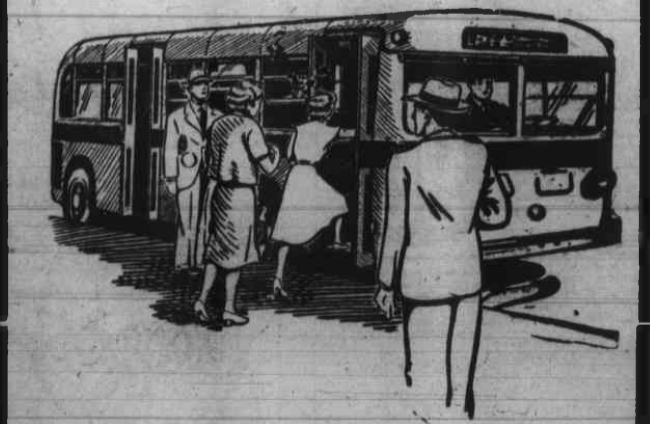

Teachers Face Arson Charge

TRYON, N. C. (ANP) — A preliminary hearing Monday, on charges of arson in connection with the burning of Tryon high school, ended in the release of Prof. LeRoy R. Wells, principal on \$5,000 bail pending grand jury action. Wells was taken into custody last week with three other persons, Hattie Smith, Arthur Suber and Cleveland Rice all suspected of complicity in the burning of the building.

Wells' arrest followed a statement to authorities by Suber that Wells had given him the money to hire Rice to burn the building, wooden structure, so that "a new brick building" might be erected.

Insurance Men Of N. C. End 17th Annual Meet

CHARLOTTE — Insurance officials, managers, office workers, agents and others of the several companies of the state, gathered here this past week, Thursday and Friday, for the seventeenth annual sessions of the North Carolina Negro Insurance association, held in the Ebenezer Baptist church.

Host to the successful meeting was the Charlotte Negro Underwriters association, and companies represented at the confab were the North Carolina Mutual, the Winston Mutual, the Bankers Fire and the Southern Fidelity Mutual.

Featuring the sessions was an Agency Institute with experts of the several companies leading in the various discussions. This proved an educational feature of the meet, with various themes being used.

Thursday from 10 to 11 p. m. was taken in registrations and assignments and shortly after 1 o'clock the opening session began. The president of the local called the convention to order, after which the National Negro Anthem was sung by the group. Prayer was next presented by the association's chaplain, C. E. Anthony. Induction of the 1939-40 officers followed.

An address of welcome was being completed for a memorial service to the late Marcus Garvey by the executive council and all branches on July 21 at Saint Mark's Methodist church.

Miss Collins also revealed there is a plan afoot to return the body of Garvey to Jamaica, B.W.I. for a final resting place. Returning via New York it is expected a demonstration will be made by local Garveyites. The body is now at rest at Paddington cemetery in England until after the war.

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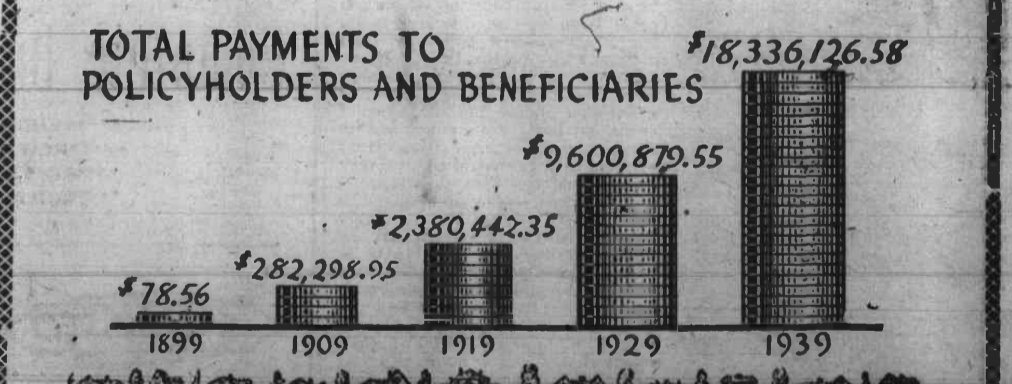
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
