Air Pilot Courses To Begin in August Fifth

CHICAGO, (ANP)—The second three month session of the non collegiate pilot training courses conducted by the National Airmen's association will begin August 5, it was announced this week by Willa B. Brown CAA director of flight training.

The course covers the subjects of history of aviation, civil air regulations, navigation, meteorology, parachutes, aircraft and theory of flight, engines, instruments, and radio uses and forms. The school is open without restriction to those who desire to take the ground school course, but who are not desirous of competing for flight scholarships.

The enrollees who desire to compete for flight scholarships must meet the following requirements:

- They must have attained their 26th birthday by July 1, 1940.
- They must be citizens of the United States.
- They must be legal residents of the state in which they enroll and compete for training.
- They must possess student pilot certificates of commercial CPT grade.
- They must not be enrolled in an institution of higher learning.

Women may compete for these scholarships. The only payment which competitors shall make is the physical examination fee of \$6.00, which will be refunded to those competitors who are awarded flight scholarships at the completion of the ground school. The physical examination fee will not be refunded to those who are not selected for flight scholarships.

Thirty CAA students are in flight training now at the Harlem airport under the instruction of Cornelius R. Coffey and Lewis A. Jackson.

Students enrolling in the ground school now and winning flight scholarships will commence flight training approximately Nov. 1, 1940 when the 30 students now in flight training complete their controlled preliminary course and pass on into the secondary stage which is the equivalent of the primary stage in the military service.

All persons interested in enrolling in this air pilots' school should apply immediately at the Wendell Phillips school.

Northern Dems. Forget Plight Of Southerners

U. S. Defense Drive Bars Jim Crowism

NEW ORLEANS, (ANP)—A "caucus" held here last week to discuss and consider the contents of a special resolution drafted by Southern Negroes to be presented to the Democratic National convention charged Negro Democrats of the North as being "unconcerned with the plight of their Southern brothers" and "indifferently incoherent as to the future of the majority of the race's political hopes."

The resolution was sent to the National Negro Democratic committee together with scores of other Democratic leaders the country over. In it were contained special requisites for consideration of the injustices and pressure practices against "three fourths of the Negro population" that live in the South.

The document bore out that the Democratic Party, if it would carry the support of the all important Negro vote" must positively express itself as to its future policy in dealing with legislation effecting Negroes. It insisted that definite steps be taken to lessen the power of Southern Party leaders who represented a small minority of the Southern population, and who upheld discrimination and racial prejudice.

The charge against Northern Democrats in this direction came from two disclosures: 1 in a letter to the Graphic Press, the National Negro Democratic committee expressed that its objectives for presentation to the Convention contained most of the clauses of the "Southern" resolution. 2 In the face of this, the Democratic Convention, instead of lessening the power of Southern prejudiced Democrats, offered to give them "bonus" delegates in the future convention, delegating more power to the "minority" represented Southern.

Praise John L. Lewis
 A favorable reaction to the resolution was expressed by John L. Lewis, famed labor leader, and special praise was expressed to him for this consideration of "a depressed group for whom their own Northern brethren give no consideration."

Endorse NAACP Program

FLINT, Michigan—The Michigan State Association of Colored Women's Clubs in convention here during the early part of July adopted the following resolution:

"Whereas the NAACP is the one organization among us standing on guard watching every phase of discrimination and unfair treatment of the Negro, be it resolved that we commend this organization and pledge it our cooperation."

Mrs. Segel Bryant is state president of the organization, and Mrs. Edith Robinson is corresponding secretary.

WASHINGTON, (ANP)—The rights of Negro citizens qualified and eligible for assignment to the \$17,381,000 national wide project for vocational training of defense workers are protected with regulations forbidding discrimination because of race, creed or color.

This announcement was made this week by Alfred Edgar Smith, staff advisor in the office of Fred R. Rauch, assistant commissioner of the Work Projects Administration who will direct WPA's share in the program.

The WPA project will provide training for approximately 100,000 persons and thus provide them with an increased knowledge of the skills necessary to speed up the total national defense program. The courses of training will be given in established public vocational schools and related facilities during July, August and September.

Sponsored by the National Defense Advisory Commission the vast program will move forward with the U. S. Office of Education serving as co sponsor. The Office of Education will available \$7,500,000 in addition to the \$9,781,340 allotted from WPA funds. State and local school boards will have the primary responsibility for the actual conduct of the courses. The project will operate in states where the need is certified by the state director of vocational education. The director will also serve as state representative of the sponsor and co-sponsor.
