

Bull Brigade And Trojans Clash Sat.

Decided CIAA Title Battle Will Be Played

Charlotte, — Ten thousand avid devotees to America's great autumnal sport are expected to be in American Legion Memorial Stadium this Saturday night, October 12, when Johnson C. Smith University's might Golden Bull Brigade lines up against the famed Virginia State Trojans, 88-89 CIAA kings in the Bulls' home opener and their first game under the lights.

And on the gridiron below, they will see unfold a drama that will probably decide the CIAA pigskin mastery for 1940. Bagged by the Trojans in a thrilling 12-0 duel last October, the Bulls have been sedulously nursing their wounds for these twelve months. Like the giant Vesuvius, the Golden Bull Brigade has at least aroused from its morbid lethargy, and what was once a forbidding muttering has become an awesome rumble and what was once a rumble has become a murderous roar.

The cry of "Big Jeff" has been "If we can get past Smith" The counter ejaculation of Eddie Jackson has been "If we can get past State." Both teams have weathered by graduation and the power, polish, and precocity of freshman reserves may be the deciding factor in the battle.

But Saturday's conflict not a "bleed" game, not a grudge game, but simply a duel between the champions of North Carolina and the champions of the CIAA will answer many questions that hang like a mystic haze over the 1940 gridiron horizon.

There is the question surrounding the wings of the Trojan forward wall, left bare by the exit of the Brewer twins. Can "Big Jeff's" recruits cope with the seasoned maneuvers of Walt

McDowell, three season campaigner, and Jack Brayboy, the Bulls' All-CIAA flanker? Has Smith found a capable replacement for "Choo Choo" Jackson to match the bruising drive of Willie Hurst, who, though converted to left half, may still be called into the fullback spot? Can the Bulls effectively operate their famed aerial circus in the face of the Trojan's airtight pass defensive?

Is the formula for Smith's twin guard combination of Mous Tolliver and Joe Tull TNT or?

But the man over whom the question mark hovers heavily is Kenny Whitlock, whom Coach Jefferson so adamantly claims to be the world's greatest punter, for Whitlock will face the acid test this Saturday night on a field that is no stranger to magic of the toe. In 1928, it lay damp with rain when Walt McDowell dropped a 45 yard field goal between the uprights to vanquish the Bluefield State Teachers 3-0. And it was on this same memorable day that "Babe Lee" an unknown freshman from Rabelle, N. J. stood on the Smith zero stripe and booted the pigskin 85 yards through the air and into the Bluefield endzone for one of the longest punts on record. Last October 14 it lay in reverent awe as McDowell gave a repeat performance, this time against the Tenn. A and I aggregation and Sugar Dowling filled the stratosphere with long and perfect punts.

Saturday, Whitlock will not have the spotlight alone, but in to one remote corner will creep another unknown freshman to draw swords with the master. And when the final whistle has been sounded, it may be this un-

known Best cub who will get the bid for No. 1 punter, USA.

And so the Golden Bull Brigade and the Trojans clash this Saturday, and from the maelstrom may rise the 1940 champions of not only the CIAA but of the nation as well.

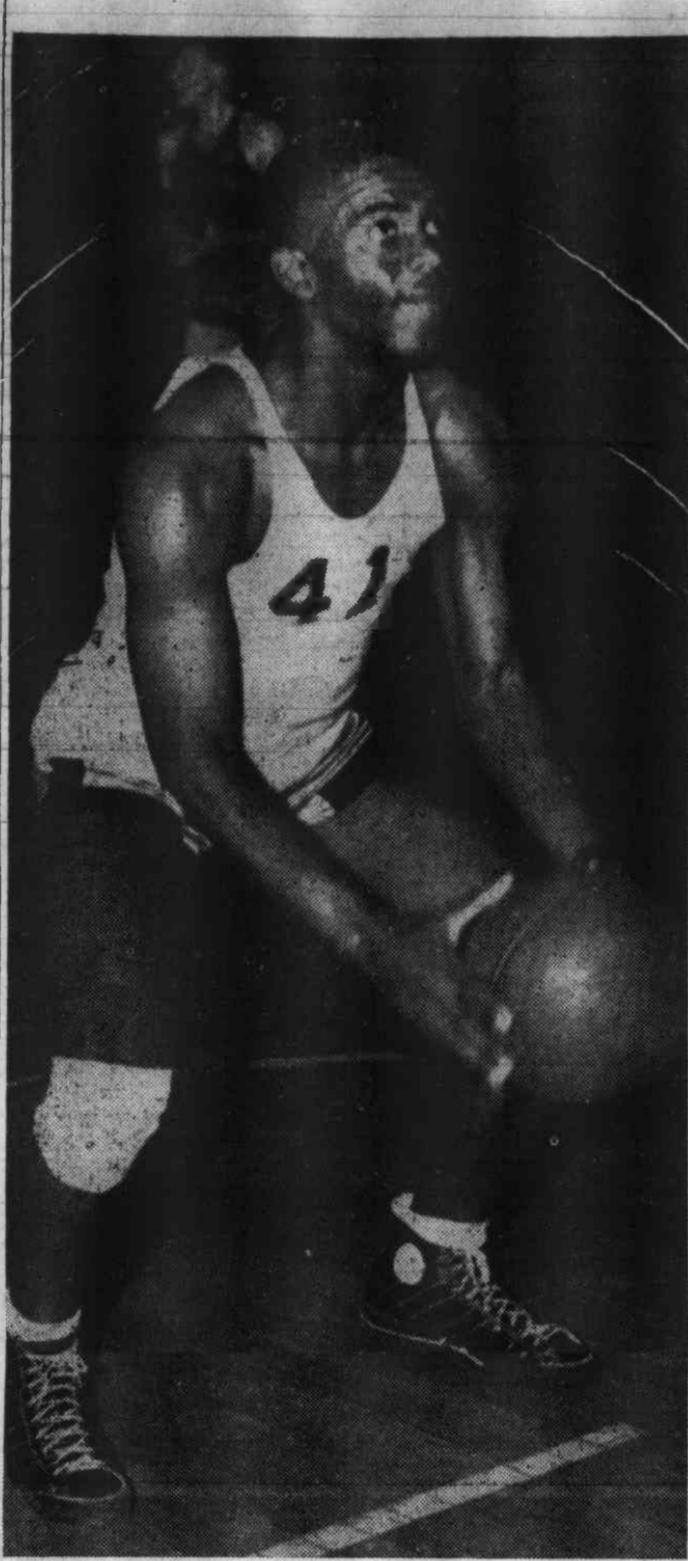

Charlotte — Launching its 1940 home schedule and CIAA campaign in gala fashion, Johnson C. Smith University has invited the 2500 high school students of Mecklenburg County, Gastonia, and Belmont to be her guests on the night of October 12 when the Golden Bull Brigade engages the Virginia State Trojans at American Legion Memorial Stadium.

Free tickets have been distributed throughout the area. The bands of Second Ward High School, West Charlotte High School and Plato Price High School have also been invited to furnish music together with the crack Johnson C. Smith University band.

Ladies' night, a new feature of

Smith's home game program, will also be initiated at the Smith-Va. State clash. All ladies, accompanied by an escort, will be admitted free to witness the tilt.

(Friday afternoon, Oct. 11 radio station WSOB, Charlotte, is lending its NBC blue network from 2:45 p. m. until 3 p. m. for an interview of Coach Jackson and a few of the more outstanding members of his Golden Bull Brigade. This will be the first time that a program of this kind has come over the Charlotte ether waves.

The broadcasting officials had hoped to bring Coach H. R. Jefferson together with a few of his charges to the microphone. However, it is impossible for Mr. Jefferson to be present.

When daylight time replaced standard time in various sections of the country on the last Sunday in April each year, "Wings Over Jordan" moves forward an hour. And on the last Sunday in Sept. with the return of eastern standard time, the famous choral program moves one hour backward.

This has been going on since 1938 on Sunday Sept. 29, when Columbia listeners again tuned in the spirituals sung by the 37 voice "Wings Over Jordan" choir they found the program on instead of 10:30 a. m. EDT, at 9:30 a. m., EDT.

With this, its 143rd consecutive program "Wings Over Jordan" presented as guest speaker Dr. F. L. Atkins, president, Winston Salem Teachers College, N. C. The choir, recruited from representative Negro churches of Cleveland, was established by Rev. Glenn T. Settle, pastor of Cleveland's Gethsemane Baptist church in an effort to promote better understanding between the races.

When Settle interested Worth Kramer, then program director of WGAR, in the idea of broadcasting such a feature, Kramer worked with the chorus as a hobby. It was not long, however before Kramer recognized the vocal beauty of the mixed voices. The program was then put on a Columbia network schedule which it has kept ever since.

Guest speakers are heard on "Wings Over Jordan" each Sunday. They are not restricted by vocation. Negro economists, educators, professionals and writers male and female have spoken to CBS audience since the series' inception January 9, 1938.

When the "Wings over Jordan" troupe reached Fairmont, West Virginia on its current tour, Worth Krjner, conductor of the choral group, rehearsed the singers in the alley back of a local theater just before they were to go on. The audience inside the theater began pouring out of the exits to listen, and choir responded with its impromptu recital. Only after a plea by the house manager, did the audience reenter to listen to the regular program.
