on the handbills that advertised the Hillside-Petersburg game here last Friday night. Those words were: "At last Hillside has some competition" and that turned out to be more truth than advertising. Durhamites have never seen the Hornets in as much trouble as they were in at times last Friday night; they spent the first half trying to keep Peersburg from scoring and most of the second half closing up the gap in the score after the visitors scored first.

These teams were not as evenly matched as the score shows. This may be judged by the statistics which show that Hillside made 9 first downs in comparison to 3 for Peabody. However, both teams showed respect for the other's line in keeping the ball in the air most of the time. Neither team scored until they began to let the passes go and the result was that each team scored with passes.

Savior of the game for Hillside was Blount, the quarterback and co-captain who was being held on the bench because of a bad ankle. He had to be pressed into service because after Peabody scored, the team seemed to do everything wrong; but when he entered the game, every spectator could see and feel that the Hornets had new life and would not stop short of a touchdown. Plummer and Lee were also on the injured list but went into the game long enough to keep Hillside on the unbeaten list.

Coach Riddick had stated before the game that if there was any possible way of keeping these men out of the game and save them for N. C. competition, he would do so, but everyone knows that if he had not been thoughtful and resourceful enough to use these men when he did, things might have been so different.

Peabody High Ties Hillside Hornets

Burghardt Switches Team At Will As CIAA Title Drive Is Launched

Winston Salem — The North Carolina College Eagles really came into their own as contenders for the CIAA championship title Saturday night in Winston Salem's Bowman Gray Memorial Stadium when they trounced the Bluefield State Teachers College eleven 13-0 before more than 5,000 fans from all sections of North Carolina and West Virginia. Two complete teams of the Eagles took part in this game, giving evidence of the kind of reserve material which is on hand this year.

During the first quarter of this game the ball stayed in the air most of the time either by exchange of punts or by passing. Both teams did a great deal of intercepting and batting down passes making the ball change hands over and over again. Toward the end of the quarter Willis of Bluefield passed to Miller who carried the ball to the NCC 2 yard stripe but at this point the Eagle forward wall stiffened and the Blues were thrown for losses each time the ball was snapped. Bluefield finally attempted a field goal which failed to cross the bars.

It was in the second quarter that the Eagles registered the first 7 points of the game. Ten new men came into the game for North Carolina College at the beginning of the quarter and they were sparked by McPharland at quarterback which Duck-widder doing the long range kicking. Before the quarter was very old, NCC blocked Bluefield's kick in the shadow of the goal and Moore, right end, recovered the ball for the touchdown. McPharland drop kicked for the extra point.

As the half ended the Eagles were staging another touchdown drive which began when George Mack intercepted a pass and later called to Hall to bring the ball to the 36 yard stripe. Johnson then advanced the ball by the 30 and passed to Peerman at the 10 yard line as the gun ended the half.

The second half featured a kicking and passing duel in which N. C. State seemed to have a slight edge; however, everyone got new tenseness when during the last three minutes of play 15 yard penalty gave the Eagles the ball on the Bluefield 25 yard line. McPharland ran the ball four yards from this point and later, when there was one minute left in the game, passed to Peerman in the end zone for another clinching touchdown. He missed his first drop kick in weeks to lose the extra point.

New Orleans, La. — More than 3000 fans witnessed the thrilling contest which found the Xavier University Gold Rush of Louisiana on the top side of a 7-2 score, defeating the vaunted LeMoyné Mad Magicians of Memphis, Tenn. LeMoyné's great backfield star, Hall, carrying the brunt of the attack for the visitors with Lavalle, his equally capable mate in the backfield, gaining considerable ground also.

Starting slowly as they did in their first contest with Tuskegee, the Ravierites found themselves "backs to the wall" with LeMoyné carrying the play in Rush territory throughout the first half. LeMoyné's only score, like last year, came in the second quarter when Tommy Mills, Los Angeles, Calif. back field ace for the locals, attempted to kick the Rush out of danger. His punt was blocked, the ball falling in the end zone for an automatic safety. Driving to the fifteen, ten, and twelve yard stripes in the fourth quarter, the Xavierites finally, through superior power, scored via a fifteen yard pass by Mills to Paxton in the end
