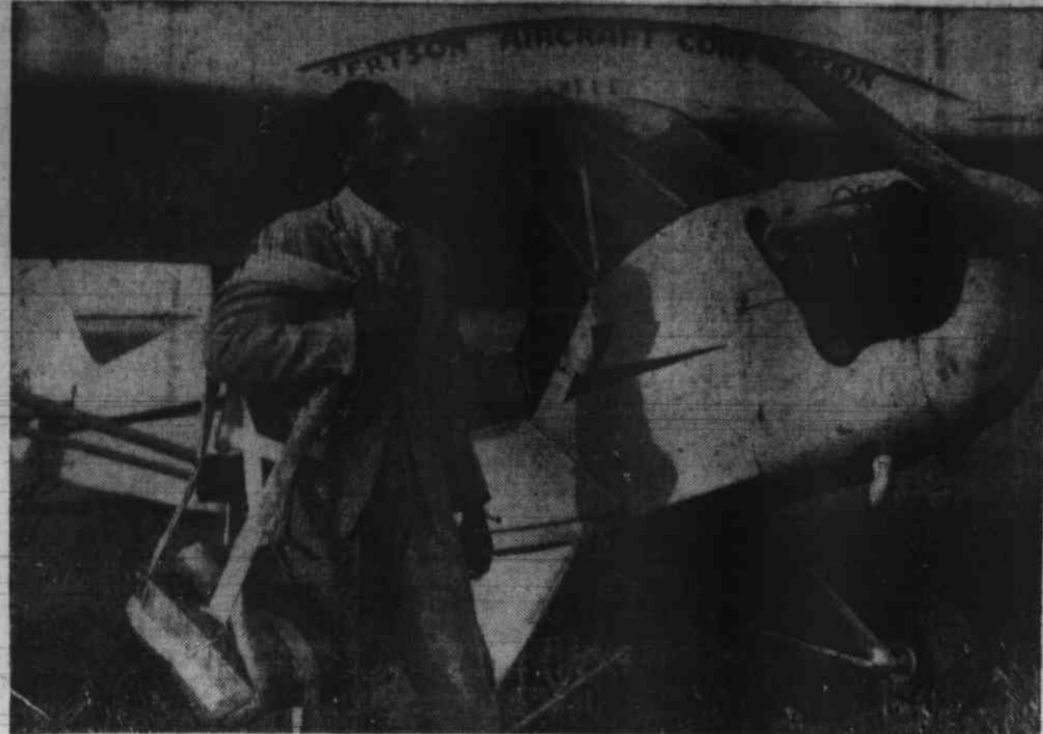
**NEW YORKER REFUSED IN ARMY AIR CORPS**

## 353 Eligible Negro Reserve Officers, Says War Department

NEW YORK—At present there are 353 eligible Negro Reserve officers, according to Robert P. Patterson, Assistant Secretary of War.

Patterson made the announcement in a letter to the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in response to an inquiry filed with his office October 1. The records of the War Department, the letter said, "indicate that a total of 4,928 Negro students have enrolled as Freshmen in the Reserve Officers Training Corps at two schools having all Negro personnel. Of these, a total of 554 have completed the four year R. O. T. C. course at these schools." No information was available, according to the letter, as to the race of students enrolled in the ROTC in mixed schools.

With the statement that both Colonel Benjamin O. Davis and his son Lt. Benjamin O. Davis, Jr. will "normally remain on their present assignments until the summer of 1942, when they will complete their four-year tour of duty," the Assistant Secretary of war said that "it is impossible to predict what future assignments will be given to any officer of the Regular Army."

## Negro Skilled Laborers Denied Jobs In Georgia

NEW YORK—A protest against the discrimination suffered by Negroes in Columbus, Georgia who sought employment in private and Government-directed defense projects in Columbus, Georgia, was launched today with the advisory council of the National Defense Commission in Washington, by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

The Association acted upon complaints received from its Columbus, Georgia branch. According to the report Negro bricklayers, carpenters, and painters have been refused clearance for jobs, through the United States Employment Bureau there. The report also pointed out that the William Lumber company in Columbus, with defense contracts totalling more than \$2,000,000, has refused to employ skilled Negro labor. Because of its importance as a military center this Georgia town is humming with defense activity, especially in the building industry.

## House Passes Ludlow Amendment To Prevent Discrimination In Defense Training Program

Washington, D. C. — The ban against discrimination contained in the Conscription Bill, was carried over into that part of the defense program affecting the trainees recruited under the Office of Education and the Na-

tional Youth Administration, when the House passed an amendment to the civil function bill H. R. 10539 introduced Sept. 23 by Representative Louis Ludlow, of Indiana.

The Ludlow amendment states that "No trainee under the foregoing appropriation, shall be discriminated against because of sex, race, or color, and where separate schools are required by law for separate population groups, to the extent needed for trainees of each such group, equitable provision shall be made for facilities and training of like quality."

## Chilly Weather Favors Fall Planting

Chilly weather and light freezing at night is not a sign that the fall planting season is at an end, but rather that it is beginning. Until the time when the ground is frozen and can no longer be firmed properly around the roots of plants, all planting operations may be carried on. Hardy plants are indifferent to temperature; it is the physical conditions which low temperatures create in the soil that puts a stop to planting.

If the ground remains unfrozen until Christmas, it will still be possible to plant perennials, including peonies and iris and all hardy bulbs, as well as shrubs and trees, and they will not suffer from the late-ness, except that they may leaf and bloom somewhat later in the spring. When any seed, bulb or plant is set in the ground it must be placed

firmly in contact with the soil. This contact is necessary in order that the roots may absorb food. It is obvious that in frozen soil such proper contact is impossible. When soil is muddy there is also likely to be unfavorable contact. The ideal condition for soil is to be moist and easily crumbled.

It is sometimes necessary to delay planting until after the ground may have frozen. Where it is known that this delay will be necessary for any reason, all that is required is to cover the surface of the ground in which the planting is to be done with 6 inches or so of leaves or other suitable mulch. This will keep the ground soft and workable during any low temperature likely to prevail before Christmas. So do not let chilly weather deter you from planting, but at the same time do not delay unduly.



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
