U. S. Justice Dept. Has Fought For All But Negro's Rights

New York — Since the establishment of its special Civil Liberties division early in 1939 the Department of Justice has failed to reveal a single instance where this newly created unit has taken action in numerous cases where Negroes have been lynched, beaten, deprived of the right to vote, and hounded by the police according to a statement issued here today by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

The statement charged that "the refusal of the United States Department of Justice to take any action whatsoever concerning the protection of the full citizenship rights of Negroes, as guaranteed by the Constitution and Federal laws, leaves no doubt in the minds of Negroes that they are unable to secure the same type of justice as other American citizens from the present Justice Department."

"The Department has been over-jealous in fighting graft and corruption, trust busting and in attacking other types of federal crimes, but it has studiously avoided cases involving the violation of the rights of Negroes protected by the Federal Constitution."

"The right of Negroes to register and vote in Federal elections is one of the rights protected by the Federal Constitution, yet the Department of Justice has refused to act to protect Negroes who sought to exercise this right in Florida, South Carolina, and Tenn., as recently as a month ago. The Department has also refused to act to protect the right of Negro jury-men from being beaten and ex-

cluded from jury service by force."

Citing the lynching last June of Elbert Williams, NAACP official, who helped to lead a right to vote campaign among Negroes in Brownsville, Tenn., as the most flagrant case brought before the Justice Department in many years, the statement quoted an association representative in Brownsville as saying: "Members of the mob that lynched Elbert Williams can be in Brownville each day going about their work as though they had killed only a rabbit. Tio Hunter, the leader of the mob recently took office as Sheriff of the county. The NAACP has successfully pulled the cover off the damnable conditions in Brownsville, and we have also exposed the discriminating practices of the Department of Justice. If the FBI men are offering an alibi that they are unable to locate the members of the mob, I am willing to lead them personally to each man named in the affidavits effidavits executed by Elisha and Thomas Davis."
