DURHAM — Averaging more than 60 points a game against conference foes in the last three starts, the North Carolina College Eagles defeated the A and T College quintet 38-22 Saturday night before 1,700 fans.

Rendered helpless before a barrage of perfect shots, the over-touted visitors trailed the entire game and never once even threatened the substantial lead of the hosts.

Ennis, displaying the quality of offensive and defensive floor work for which he gained the 1940 Coach Johnny McLendon award, initiated one scoring thrust after another. Captain Ennis staged a comeback in the State-Smith game after being laid up with a knee injury. Using a self-styled hocus pocus pass he connects with cat quick speed.

Individual honors for the encounter went to Colbert, Eagle's All CIAA center, who rang up 17 points.

The Aggies seemed under confident and erratic as the Eagles crowded them closely in all offensive maneuvers. The guests failed to pierce the air tight defense of the giants except for five field goals, the totals number registered for the entire game.

Lefty Evans, veteran Aggie center, accounted for 10 of his team's 22 points and made a valiant attempt to stabilize his mates.

Coach Johnny McLendon and his feathered flock are unbeaten by conference foes. They won their glory jaunt with a 32-20 win over Shaw University and defeated a hapless Hampton quint 59-40 to dedicate their new gym. Taking the road, the Eagles tamed the St. Paul Tigers 58-33 and staged a scoring extravaganza Howard University when they defeated the Bisons 74-49. In a fever raiser the giants nosed out South Carolina College of Orangeburg 44-46 and in the same week embarrassed the Golden Bulls of Johnson C. Smith Uni-

Hampton Defeats St. Paul 56 to 44

HAMPTON Institute, Va. — Showing a complete reversal of form, the Hampton Pirates defeated the Saint Paul Tigers 55 to 44 on the Hampton court, Saturday, February 1.

Paced by "Tiny" Thompson, veteran forward, who scored 26 points, the Pirates took the lead soon after the opening whistle and never relinquished it throughout the contest.

In the final minutes of the game the Tigers put on a rally that brought them within eight points of the Pirates. This spurt did not last, however, and the Pirates forged further ahead. At the half Hampton led 24 to 14 courtmen, was sensational. Standouts for Hampton were "Tiny" Thompson, Captain, Jules Jackson, and John "Aoe" Phillips.

BALTIMORE, Md. — Trailing six points with only seven minutes to play, the clever passing Morgan State College Bears put on a sensational rally in the closing stages of the game to conquer a courageous and spirited Tuskegee Institute five, 63 to 61, here in an inter-sectional battle at the New Albert Auditorium Saturday night.

A field goal by John Staten, substitute forward, in the last 15 seconds of play was the decisive blow that sent a capacity crowd into an enthusiastic uproar.

The Alabamans, making their first appearance in Baltimore, took the lead midway in the second half after trailing most of the way and being on the short end of a 31 to 29 score at half-time. Early in the second half the score was tied. Tuskegee soon ran up a lead of 6 points. It was at this point that Captain Lionel (Duce) Gibson, Mat Garrison, Paul Hutchinson, and Gibby Givens teamed up to again tie the count. In the midst of this rally and after Tuskegee had made another goal, Gibby Givens, whose offensive thrust aided the Bears no little, was called out via the four foul route. But Johnny Staten, his substitute, came in and sank the winning field goal in the last few seconds of play.

Bears' Seventh Straight Win This victory was Morgan's seventh straight win without a single setback, and the second triumph in two days, having defeated Howard University on Friday night.

Gibson Lead Scorers Duce Gibson, Bears co-captain, was high point man. The veteran sharp shooter sank eight field goals and tossed four markers from the foul line for twenty points. His teammate, Givens, was second with sixteen and W. Smith followed with fourteen and thirteen points respectively.

Throughout the second half the see-sawed back and forth until the Aggies took the lead at 32-32 with about four minutes left in the game. The Trojans were never able to over come the lead as the game ended 37-34.

Morgan State Drops Howard U, 49-34

BALTIMORE, Md. — The Morgan State College basketball eagles won their first home CIAA conference game here Friday night when they out scored Coach Burr's Howard University Bisons, 49 to 34 at the New Albert Auditorium.

Leading by a score of 21 to 19 at mid way point by virtue of Madison Garrison's four field goals, Morgan was pushed hard because Flip Jackson trailed Garrison with three shots from the floor for the visitors in the initial half scoring. Captain Lionel Gibson, veteran high scoring forward, was sent to the sidelines during the first few minutes of play due to an ankle injury and Oscar (Gibby) Givens, star frosh forward, replaced him and Gibby did all right for the Bears' cause by finding the cords for five field goals and one foul toss to tie with his running mate, Madison Garrison, long range shooting ace, with eleven tallies.

Gain Top Scorers

William Sugar Cain, Bears' center topped all scorers with 13 points. Moose Fletcher, former Armstrong star and promising Howard's forward, nosed out Garrison and Givens for runner-up honors with twelve tallies.

In the preliminary game Morgan Junior Varsity nosed out the Howard Junior Varsity, 31 to 29. Bob Reds Duncan was high scorer, garnering five field goals and three charity shots for thirteen points, while teammate, Webster Lewis, trailed with ten.

PETERSBURG, Va. — Coach Eddie Hart and his Morgan State College Bears are booked for a one night stand at Virginia State College on Monday night, February 10, at 7 o'clock in what will be the first court meeting of the two arch rivals this season.

The last time that Hart brought his boys to Petersburg it was to prove to the Douting Thomases that his 1940 grid machine was better than anything that the Trojans could put on the field and he did just that.

But that was during the last football season, and this is the basketball season—a sport that the Morganites don't play with quite the same finesse that they do football. And so it seems as how the Trojans are all warmed up and waiting until Monday night because the Petersburg leads do know their ABC's on the hardwoods despite a recent licking at the hands of Rollie Bernard's Bulldogs.

Harry Jefferson, the Trojan coach, has been shifting his combination until he feels he has just about hit the jackpot. The floor work and passing of the Virginia State Combine which features Hurst and veteran Percy Smith is like the smoothness of blacket velvet when it's clicking.

The Bears on the other hand are so set up for any team. They have been touted as having a passing attack that is better than Union's—that one man's opinion, however. Morgan's upset in Philly recently over Manny Rivera's Lincoln Lions bids well that the boys from the Baltimore backwoods are no hicks. Thus it seems that the Trojan-Bear tilt in Petersburg should provide the sport wags with the real thing.

Probable line up for the Bears will be Garrison and Givens at the forward spots, Cain holding down the center post, and Hutchinson and Gittens doing the guard chores. Unless somebody breaks a leg or something, Coach Jefferson will probably start George Weeks and Percy Smith at forward, Jessie Brown at center and Willie Hurst and Bob Weaver at the guard positions.
