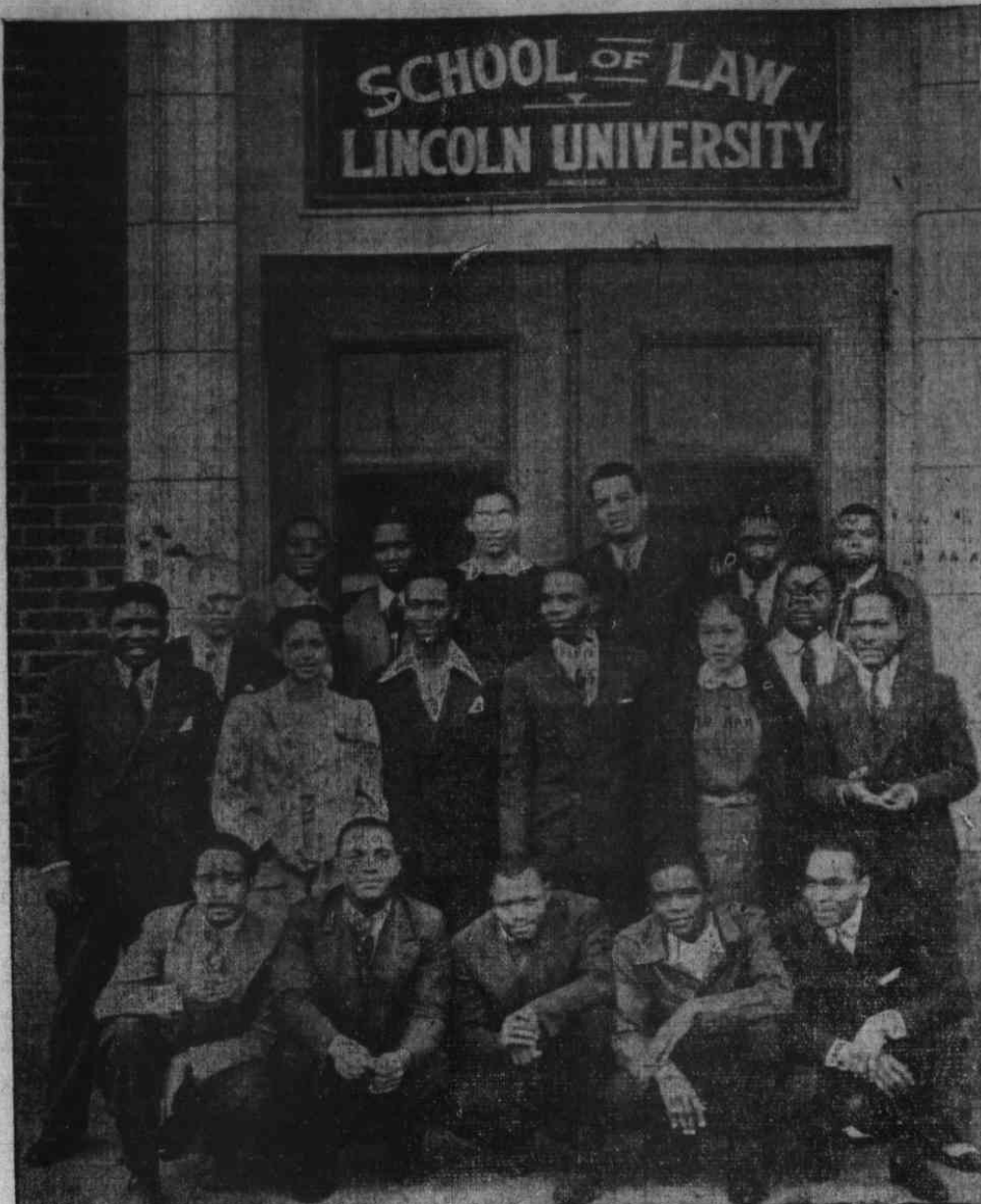

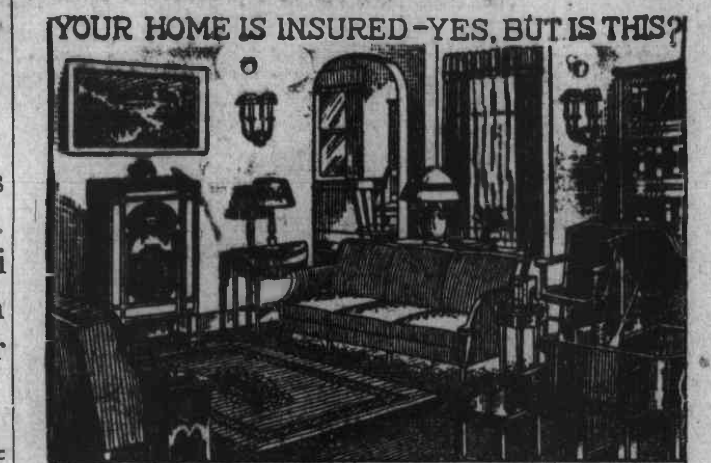
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Soup's On!

Did you ever come into a kitchen where a soup was being slowly simmered to a state of deliciousness? The air is fragrant with the mixed bouquet from cooking vegetables and meat broth. One sniff is enough to make you hungry even though meal-time is still hours away.

A few pennies' worth of vegetables and an inexpensive cut of meat will make enough soup to feed the ordinary family thrice over. And if you have a modern electric range, much of the inconvenience that once accompanied soup-making is eliminated. For, recessed in the surface of the electric range is a cooker that acts as a built-in soup kettle. Soup that is made in this cooker does not tie up surface space needed for other cooking, even though it simmers for hours.

Nor does it use up much fuel as it cooks. For this cooker is so well insulated that a very low heat, one of several speeds at which the cooker operates, will keep the soup hot and bubbling. And since there is no open flame connected with the cooker, you need not be afraid to let the soup cook unwatched, even if there are small children in the house.

Here is a soup that is worthy to provide the mainstay of many a luncheon—a vegetable soup made with hamburger instead of a soup bone. Serve it steaming hot in big bowls, with crusty buns or crackers as an accompaniment.

Hamburger Vegetable Soup (Serves 8 to 10)

- 1 pound hamburger
- 2 tablespoons fat
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon prepared mustard

Place fat in deep well cooker of electric range. Melt over high heat, then add hamburger and cook about 15 minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent lumping of ground meat. Season with salt, pepper, and mustard. Add diced carrot, turnip, onion, tomato and water. Cover, bring to boiling point over high heat, then turn to low heat and simmer for 45 minutes. Add potatoes and lima beans. (If canned beans are used, do not drain). Replace cover and simmer over low heat for 30 minutes.

This tomato chicken soup, even though it is made by combining two prepared soups with milk, water and seasonings, and consequently does not require long simmering, can be most conveniently heated in the well cooker of the electric range.

Tomato Chicken Soup (Serves 6)

- 2 tablespoons onion (finely chopped)
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 No. 1 cans condensed chicken soup
- 1 No. 1 can condensed tomato soup
- 1 1/2 cups water
- 1 1/2 cups light cream or milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon white pepper

Place onion and butter in deep well cooker over high heat. Saute onion until yellow and transparent. Add remainder of ingredients, stirring to blend thoroughly.

\$13,779,000 Paid In N. C. In 1940 By Life Insurance Co.s

North Carolina families during 1940 received an aggregate of \$13,779,000 from life insurance companies in settlement of death claims, the Institute of Life Insurance announced today.

The flow of life insurance funds into these homes, averaging \$1,148,000 a month in this state, provides a stabilizing factor in the family and the business life of every community," Holgar J. Johnson, president of the Institute of Life Insurance, stated in making the figures public.

Of the death benefits paid to families in this state last year, \$11,129,000 was in settlement of ordinary policies, \$962,000 in payments on group certificates and \$1,688,000 in claims on industrial policies.

For the nation as a whole, the life insurance companies paid benefits averaging more than \$303,000 every hour during 1940, an aggregate of \$2,664,339,000. Death benefits alone accounted for \$113,000 every hour, an aggregate for the year of \$994,950,000. Of this, \$728,965,000 was paid out on ordinary group insurance certificates and \$161,845,000 under industrial insurance policies. The total number of policies maturing as death claims during the year was 1,024,000.

The average size of each policy's death claim was \$2,756 for ordinary life, \$2,057 for group insurance, \$219 for industrial insurance and \$969 for all policies averaged together.
