

State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

What is the proper distance to set tobacco plants in the field?

ANSWER: A distance of 24 inches with the rows four feet wide has proven to be the most satisfactory under average conditions. On more fertile soils, even closer in the row will be more profitable. About a week or ten days after transplanting, cultiv-

ate the tobacco with a small cultivator. A hoe cultivation is usually necessary at this time. Following the first cultivation, tobacco should be worked every week or ten days up to a week prior to topping.

QUESTION: What are the essentials of a desirable grazing crop for poultry?

ANSWER: Such a crop, says Roy Dearstyne, head of the State College Poultry Department, should be tender, succulent, low in fiber, easily digested, and relished by the birds. It must supply abundant grazing and remain tender

Seeking Capable Candidates for Election Citizens' Movement In Charlotte

CHARLOTTE. — (Special) — Charlotte will nominate candidates for its Mayor and City Council on April 28 and elect them on May 6. The most important feature of this campaign is the Citizens' Movement, originally called the Good Government League. This interesting development in Charlotte politics was started two years ago in the citizens campaign, but was not carried through because of the difficulty in obtaining candidates.

Ordinarily, persons who want to be elected offer themselves for office; the citizens Movement drafts candidates whether or not they want to run. Usually they would much prefer to be left alone to their business and private lives. Such a draft is always very difficult and can never be successful except when the need of new faces in office is widely recognized. It is equally important to the success of such movement that neither those who develop the movement nor those who consent to be drafted act for any selfish motive. If they did, such a movement would be only another political scheme. In a public statement the candidates of the citizens movement have pledged to the people that they have no selfish motive to serve, that they have no promises of any kind to anyone about anything and that they are not committed to hire or fire anyone. That no member of the Citizens Movement can profit personally is the foundation of its appeal to the public.

At a dinner meeting attended by more than 100 citizens on March 17th the 1941 movement began. A committee consisting of Henry Allison, John Durham and Frank H. Kennedy was appointed to select the necessary committees. This committee appointed a draft board headed by George W. Patterson, who has been assisted by about a score of prominent citizens in the task of selecting candidates. After a most careful consideration Judge E. Currie was selected as the nominee for Mayor of Citizens Group. His candidacy has already proven widely popular with the people of this community.

A large number of persons were interviewed and at conclusion of their labors, the draft board announced eight candidates for City Council, they are as follows: Charles B. Ross, Lester W. Slye, James A. Baker, C. C. Beasley, Claude Albee, J. H. Painter and A. Z. Price.

Mr. Albee is at present a member of the City Council and has been accepted by the citizens group, which also sought to induce John L. Wilkinson to retirement; but was unable to do so because of Mr. Wilkinson's extended absences from the city.

This slate of candidates is considered representative and in every respect worthy to serve the City of Charlotte. Leaders of Citizens group emphasize that it is not a clean up organization, that it is not making personal accusations against present members of the council and that it is a positive and constructive

LEGAL NOTICE

TO ALL OWNERS OF DOGS IN THE CITY AND COUNTY OF DURHAM RELATIVE TO THE LAW REQUIRING INOCULATION AGAINST RABIES . . .

On and after June 1, 1941 all persons owning or harboring dogs three months of age or older will be required to show a certificate that the animal has been inoculated against rabies. Any Peace Officer or Game Warden in the City of Durham or Durham County has authority under the law to view the certificate which must be signed by a qualified Veterinarian to the effect that the dog has been inoculated within a period of twelve months. Any and all persons found to be owning or harboring dogs within violation of this law will be subject to a fine of \$50.00 and imprisonment for thirty days within the discretion of the Court.
