
Wins All-Expense Scholarship at Talladega



All we ask is that we be given an opportunity to show. you these beautiful burial lots.

The lots in this cemetery are being sold on terms, which are within the reach of all Negro people. If you are unable to purchase family lots, you may purchase single, double or triple graves or just as many as you may need.

A wise person prepares for the burial of their loved ones while they are still in good health and does not wait until the scythe of the reaper does away with members of their families.
