S. C. OPEN TOURNAMENT AT A. & M. COLLEGE, JULY 9, 10, 11th.

Tuskegee Institute, Ala., June 30. — Members of Tuskegee's crack women's track and field team left the campus today for Ocean City, New Jersey, the scene of a former triumph, where they will participate in the National A. A. U. Championships, which will take place on July 5. These young women won the 1941 Indoor A. A. U. Championships held at Atlantic City, New Jersey, this Spring.

The squad of ten girls that Coach Christine Evans Petty is taking this year, while not as formidable as championship teams of other years, are determined to give a good account of themselves. This group of ten girls holds not only the team championship, but also four individual championships, either indoors or outdoors, as well as the world's indoor 400 Meter Relay Record which they set in Atlantic City in the 1941 meet.

The team of Lucy Newell, Hester Brown, Rowent Harrison and Leila Perry lowered the record from 20.8 seconds to 50.3 seconds. Relay team "A" this year has been arranged differently from the indoor season. The four girls to defend their outdoor relay championship will be Lucy Newell, leading off; Leila Perry to run the second leg; Rowena Harrison, running in the third position and Alice Coachman, the Indoor Coach Christine Evans Petty and Outdoor High Jump Champion, running at anchor.

Other entries aer as follows: In the 50 Meter Run, Lucy Newell, the National Indoor Standing Broad Jump Champion, will again compete against Jean Lane of Wilberforce University who barely nosed her out in the 50 Meter Run last year. Mayme Taylor, a newcomer to big time competition, but who is capable of doing 6.7 seconds, will be the other Tuskegee entry.
