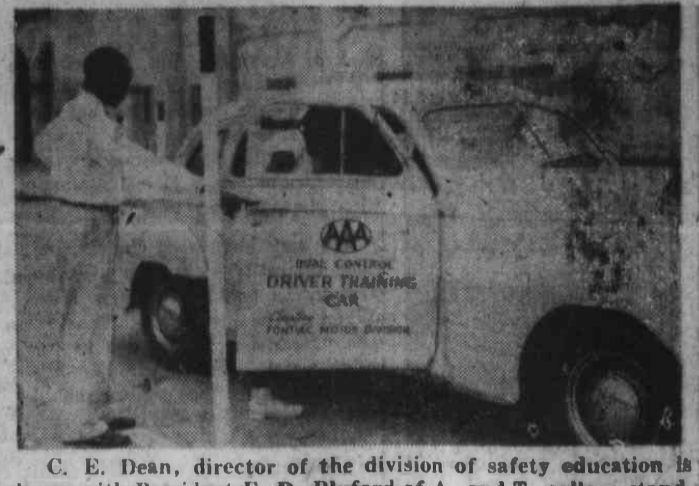
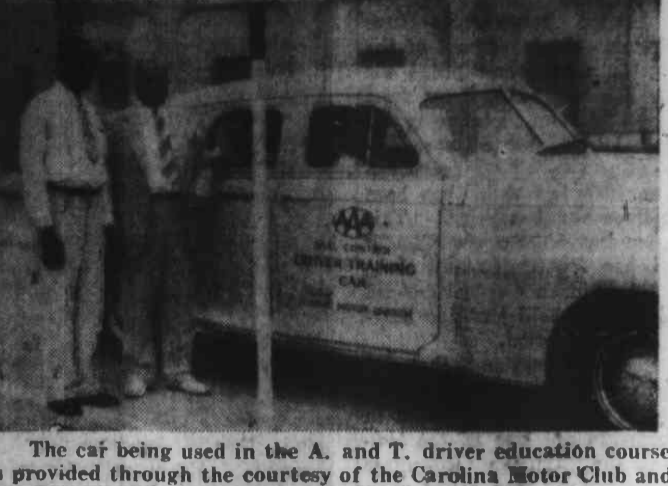




C. E. Dean, director of the division of safety education at A. and T. college is standing at the side of the new sedan which is being used for the course in safety education at A. and T. college.

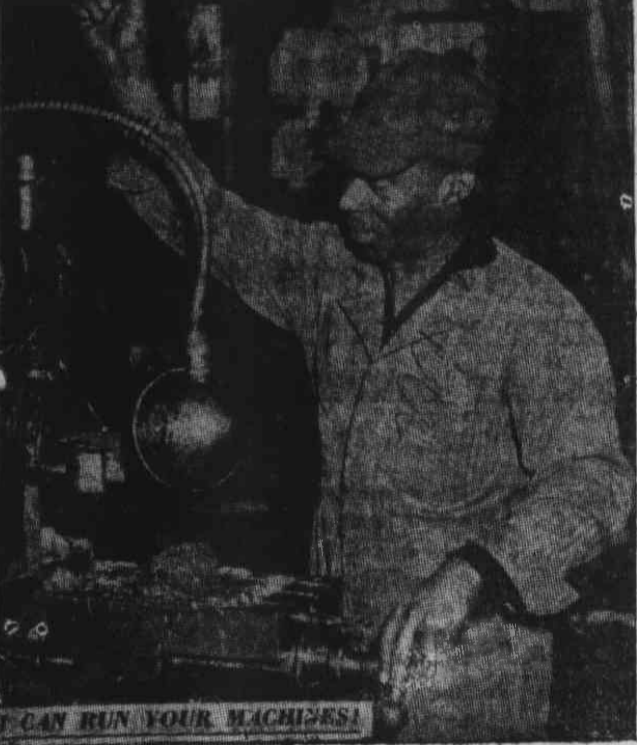

I Can Run Your Machines!" Urban League Tells Story With Pictures



New York City, New York.—The National Urban League this week announced from its headquarters at 1133 Broadway, that approximately 8,000 employers of industrial labor throughout the country have received copies of "I CAN RUN YOUR MACHINES!" a pictorial pamphlet which states the case for Negro workers to employers who have never made use of their labor.

Already favorable results have developed from the use of this pamphlet which has been distributed directly from the national office of the League to employers holding national defense contracts, and from the forty-five local affiliates among employers in both defense and non-defense industrial fields. A number of white and Negro civic organizations have also ordered large numbers of the pamphlet to distribute among heads of firms in cities where Urban Leagues are not located.

The pamphlet is a 16-page publication of convenient size, profusely illustrated and with concise narrative in bold type. It is forth the situation of the unemployed Negro worker who refused job opportunity.
