New Coach Arrives At A & T College To Assist Bernard

Greensboro, N. C.—Archie Harris, world's discus hurling champion, and "Big Ten" football ace, arrived at A. and T. college last week, to take up his duties as assistant coach to Rollie Bernard. Although Harris received many offers to play professional football with such teams as the Philadelphia Eagles, Pittsburgh Steelers, Long Island Red Skins, and the Patterson Panthers, he turned them down to coach at A. and T., "because athletics has given me some of the best in life, and I want to help other fellows to build strong physical and moral character, so they too can enjoy the best and will be able to meet the problems which they will face later on in life."

"We hope to develop winning teams," said Archie, who paused long enough from his workout on the A. and T. college athletic field, Friday, August 29, to give his plans and expectations for the coming year. "Since I've been here," he declared, "the spirit of co-operation which I've witnessed between the administration and student body are conducive to the developing of those winning teams. I'm working with a fine fellow, Rollie Bernard, whose aims are the same as mine."

Archie's greatness was by no means thrust upon him. Working every summer, for the past nine years, as a lifeguard at the beach at Ocean City, N. J., in order to help defray college expenses, he developed the powerful physique which gave him the name of "King of the Discus". While in Ocean City high school, Harris won records in the shot put and discus which still stand. As a junior in high school, Wilmington, Del., his record of 175 ft. George A. Johnson, principal of Howard a graduate of Indiana university, saw Harris in action and high school, Wilmington, Del., recommended him to Coach E. C. Hayes of Indiana university. As a result of Mr. Johnson's efforts, Harris decided to further his education at Indiana university.

Harris began his college career by setting a freshman record in the shot put and discus which is still unsurpassed. In three varsity years, he has won

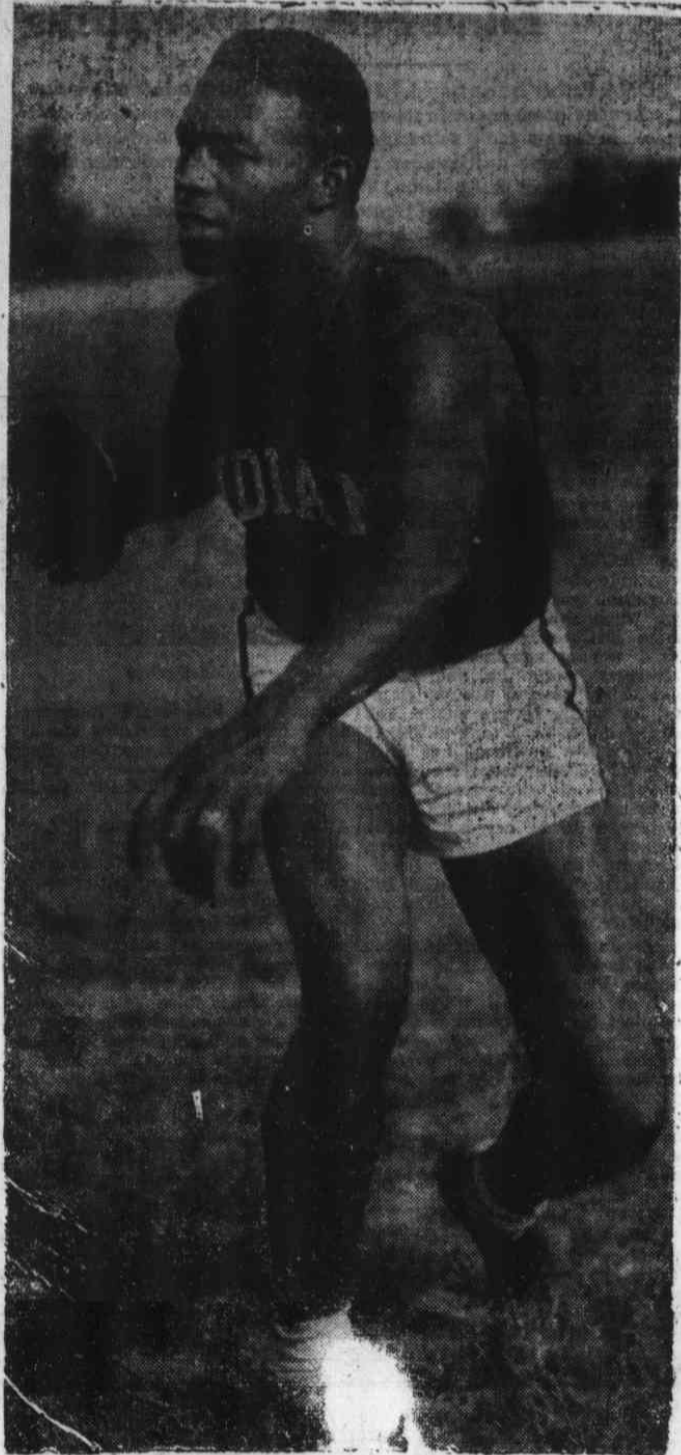

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State Health Officer Reports On The Health Of the Army

Raleigh — Dr. Carl V. Reynolds, State Health Officer, tonight issued the following statement upon his return from six of the eight counties where fall arm maneuvers are to be held, where he contacted local officials as well as army officers from Fort Bragg:

"About two years ago North Carolina put on an intensive campaign against venereal disease and has since established nearly 300 clinics where sufferers can secure

treatment, free, until cured. This program has been prosecuted with gratifying results, materially lowering the infection rate and the incidence of syphilis in this State.

"The incoming of the soldier has magnified our problem, and today it has become alarming, necessitating a survey of actual conditions among those stationed at Fort Bragg, the results of which convinced us it was essential that we, as custodians of the health of our citizens and that of our boys in camp, we give the public a factual statement.

"It was not our purpose to censure or persecute any person or persons or localities. We were convinced, however, that a truth-statement, backed by official and authoritative evidence, should be publicized, let the chips fall where they might.

"Surely, it is sufficient evidence that prostitution is being allowed and sometimes condoned when the report reveals specifically that the contacts resulting in venereal disease were made at a definite place in a named city or hamlet; that the solicitors, in many instances, were taxicab drivers and bellhops, and that the contacts took place within specified hotels and houses of prostitution.

"From the ranks of registrants only those are chosen to be soldiers who are sound in body. Selectees found to be suffering with venereal diseases when they are examined are not accepted. "To allow prostitution and houses of prostitution to flourish places a premium on venereal diseases. It causes the registrant who had a venereal disease to be rejected — and perhaps makes your boy next in line to take his place.

Citizens Seek USO For Negro Soldiers

C. A. Irvin, Public Relations Director of the Carolina Times, announced today that an effort is under way, to provide a U. S. O. Club room for colored soldiers coming into the Queen City.

Mr. Irvin, expressed opinion that such facilities here are very important since there are a number of colored soldiers stationed at the Army Base and that because the 41st Engineers, a colored unit of nearly 1400 men from Fort Bragg is now stationed at near by Monroe, preparing for the huge Army maneuvers, which will be held in this section during this fall and because Charlotte being located on the main line of the Southern Railway, a number of soldiers will often have to spend many hours here awaiting connections. Such a club stated Irvin, would offer recreation rooms, lounges, meeting rooms, aid to transient service men contacts between soldiers and their homes when necessary and all of the services one might expect from an organization.

Mr. Irvin stated that a committee of leading colored citizens is being formed to work in close co-operation with the local chairman of the United Service Organization for the purpose of working out a plan in this direction which will be satisfactory to all.

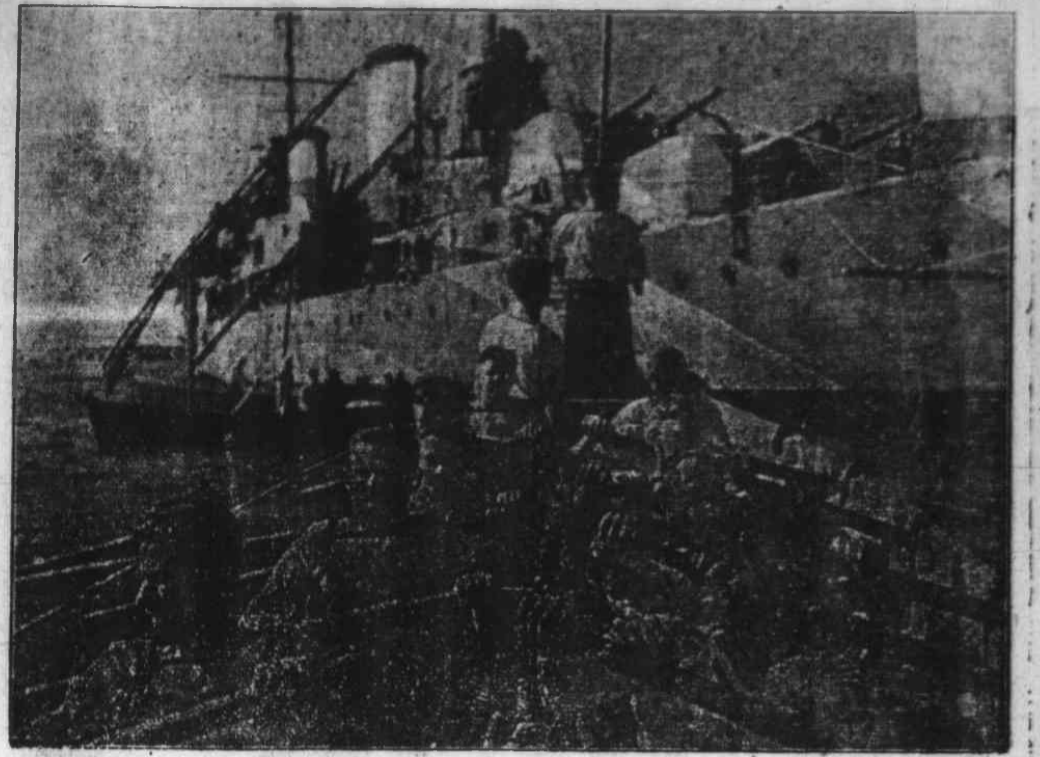

AUSTRALIA'S small but tough navy of six cruisers and numerous smaller vessels plays an important part in the Allied struggle to hold the Mediterranean. Returning here to their ship are bearded sailors of H.M.A.S. Perth, which earlier had fought in the Battle of Matapan and helped inflict losses of at least three cruisers and one destroyer on the Italians. 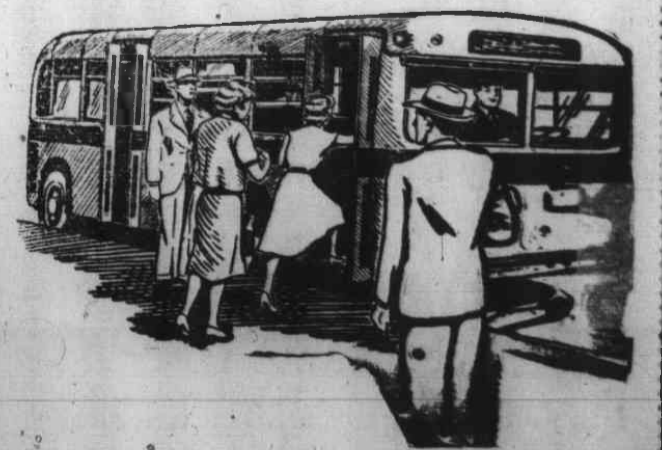
